IRON INDUSTRY AT BELLA COOLA

Proposal to Smelt Ore There by Electro-Thermic Process

The practicability of the establishment in British Columbia of an iron and steel industry was the subject of an interview this morning between G. Lewis Casey, president of the Smelters Co., of Seattle, and Hon. Wm. Sloan, Minister of Mines, says a Victoria paper of recent date.

Mr. Casey's company has acquired extensive iron ore deposits together with a ten-acre tract of land, at Dean Channel, a northerly arm of Burke Channel on which the town of Bella Coola is situated. Conditions for the extraction of ore, which assays 52 1/2 per cent. metallic iron with very small percentage of impurities, are ideal, it being possible to bunker the mineral at tidewater by gravity.

Some Shipped Already.

A quantity of this British Columbia ore already has been shipped to the plant of the Smelters' Steel Co. at Seattle where, by means of the electro-thermic method, it has been converted, in one operation, into the highest grade of grey iron castings. The characteristic fine texture and close grain of the product, for which there is an insistent market, with unfilled orders on hand at \$65 a ton is sufficient comment on the quality of the Provincial ore and the efficacy of the electrical form of treatment adopted.

The B. C. Act.

Mr. Casey's object in waiting on Mr. Sloan, as stated, was to discuss matters relating to the possibility of the Company's becoming established on this side of the line. His attention having been directed to the Iron Bounties Act, under the terms of which a company producing pig iron from local ore in the province will receive from the Government a bonus of \$3 for every ton manufactured.

Mr. Casey, therefore, asked whether Mr. Sloan would be prepared to consider the application of the terms of the "Iron Ore Supply Act," which permits the Government to supply ore to a plant, electrical or blast furnace, for experimental purposes to his proposition.

Every Encouragement Offered

To this the Minister of Mines replied that the Department of Mines, as administered under the present government, had offered every encouragement to legitimate enterprise along the line in question, and that he had no hesitation in undertaking that all reasonable assistance would be tendered a responsible company contemplating the development of the iron ore resources of the province, and wholly in the province.
