Dominion Government Replies To Representations of Labor

Cognize Right to Organize in Industrial Field but not for Those in Service of State; Eight Hour Day.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 5.—Replies to the demands, requests and suggestions of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress have been forwarded by the secretary of that organization. Regarding the right to organize, the Government points out that this has been recognized as far as industrial workers is concerned, but to request that this principle be applied to Government employees is refused. This is definitely conveyed in the following: "Employees in the service of the Federal Government are in a different category. Inasmuch as there is no incentive

the standpoint of money to impose unfair or onerous conditions or rates of pay cannot be conceded that service employees shall be brought to the control of any organization or federation of industrial workers and benefit in industrial disputes."

Collective Bargaining.
Reply to the suggestion that Government recognize the principle of collective bargaining substituting it in its own departments wherever practicable. The initiative in establishing councils in industries organizing trades unions as the principle of representation, the Government states:

"The administration of the Government of Labor, the minister of that department has on more than one occasion recognized the wisdom on the part of employers and employees in such cases or as groups in a given industry, of meeting together and negotiating with a view to the settlement of differences existing between them."

48-Hour Week.
The request for the adoption of the forty-eight hour week for an eight-hour day. It is explained: "The Peace Treaty demands the adoption of a forty-eight-hour week for an eight-hour day. It is a firm purpose to give legal effect to the terms so agreed upon."

Other question as to whether necessary legislation within the jurisdiction of the Federal Parliament of Canada or of the provincial legislatures is now being considered in view of reaching understanding with the provinces on this subject.

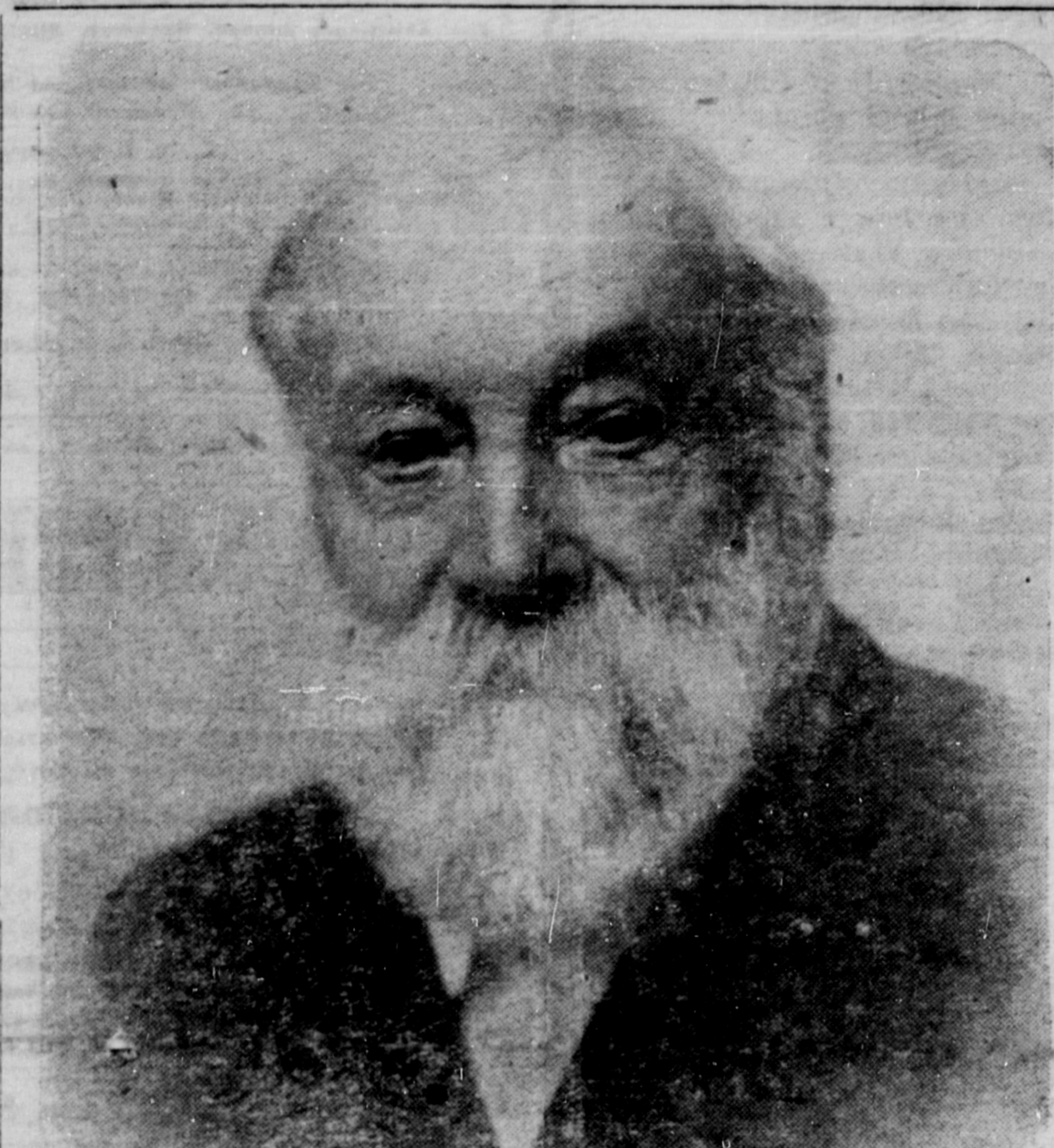
Porte Cabinet Resigns

Turkey to Be Shorn of Territory But to Keep All Her Sacred Places

LONDON, March 5.—Turkey is stripped of virtually all her territory in Europe but retains the sacred places by a treaty now being completed by the Conference of Foreign Ministers and Ambassadors.

Thrace has been awarded to Greece, but the present conference is charged with the task of working out plans whereby Turkey will keep control of the sacred places and Adrianople. Smyrna will be placed under Greek control.

BIG DOG DERBY MARCH 16 NEXT

Field of Twenty-one Entries is Expected in 100-Mile Non-Stop Race.

THE PAS, March 5.—The 1920 Hudson Bay dog derby will be started on Tuesday, March 16, with a searchlight, and huge bonfires lighting up the banks of the Saskatchewan River. A field of 21 entries is looked for.

The race is a 100-mile non-stop. The trails are reported to be heavy and drifted in spots and the race managers, it is expected, will send out a few teams the day before in order to break such parts of the trail as need it.

UNION CAUCUS NEXT TUESDAY

MAJOR OF MOUNTED POLICE HAS DIED AT HAWAIIAN CITY

VANCOUVER, B.C., March 4.—A cable received here from Honolulu says Major J. E. Fitz-Horrikan, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for B. C., is dead. Major Fitz-Horrikan went to Honolulu for the benefit of his health. He joined the Mounted Police in 1899 and spent 13 years in the service in the Yukon.

MOTOR CARS WILL HAVE DIM LIGHTS

Bill to Make Illegal the Bright Headlights Which Annoy Passengers.

The Government bill introduced into the Provincial Legislature providing for dim or partly dim lights on motor cars reads as follows:

"No lighting device over four-candle power equipped with a reflector shall be used unless the same shall be so designed, deflected, or arranged that no portion of the beam of reflected light when measured seventy-five feet or more ahead of the lamps shall rise above forty-two inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands, under all conditions of road: Provided, however, that this subsection shall not apply to what is known to the trade as 'spot-lights' when used as such but such 'spot-lights,' if so used, shall not be directed at an approaching vehicle."

TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT

LONDON, March 5.—The Dutch Government has offered a large prize for an air flight from Holland to the Dutch West Indies, a distance of 9,200 miles.

Crerar Criticizes But Asks Election

Union Government has Served its Purpose, he Thinks, and House Cleaning Now Due; Redistribution First Perhaps.

OTTAWA, March 5.—Criticising both the leader of the Government and the leader of the opposition for lack of constructive thought in their speeches, Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the cross benches in the House of Commons, declared he would support the King amendment calling for a general election, because he felt that the Union Government had served its purpose and a house cleaning was now due. A new administration was needed to cope with the troubles of Canada.

T. W. Caldwell, Carlton, N. B., and O. R. Gould, of Assiniboia, then made speeches defending the agrarian platform against charges of class legislation, and declaring that the tariff penalized farmers.

Hon. Arthur Meighen defended the Government and attacked Mackenzie King's demand for an election and said that Crerar was the leader of a class party.

Want Redistribution.

W. A. Buchanan of Lethbridge, declared he would support the Government on the assurance that there would be a census and registration to give the west fair treatment in representation. He condemned those who would oppose the tariff indiscriminately.

W. H. Whidden of Brandon declared the franchise should give the vote only to those of Canadian citizenship.

W. F. McLean of South York said the Prime Minister should be in the House more often. He wanted redistribution before an election.

NO REFRIGERATOR CARS THIS MORNING

There Was, However, 89,000 lbs. of Halibut Landed at 9c and 6c Today.

The car situation is again bad at the waterfront, there being no cars available for the fish at this morning's fish sale. The Cold Storage and the Royal Fisheries were the only bidders at the sale and the price paid was 9c and 6c. The Johanna, not satisfied with the price offered, cleared for Seattle with 18,000 pounds. The Royal Fisheries bought the catch of the Clara N., a Canadian boat, 2,500 pounds.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage bought up the catches of the following boats which will be put in cold storage:—Clara, 3,000 lbs.; Hervester, 4,500; Norlund, 30,000; Myrtle, 8,000; Daisy, 2,500; Vienna, 8,000; Marguerite, 5,000; Mayflower, 3,000 lbs.
