Mining News

The Last Chance Mine, Green-
wood, has been leased by James
Poggi from the government. This
mine was for some time a con-
stant shipper of high-grade ores
but for some years has been idle.
Mr. Poggi will start work im-
mediately, sinking a new shaft
and installing an electric hoist.

In view of the attention that
the mining world is giving to the
Alice Arm district during the past
winter, considerable development
is looked for there this spring.
Quite a number of properties are
starting in business to sell Alice
Arm property and a great many
claims have been staked in the
district lately. In fact all the
property with any immediate
reach of railway, trail or river
has been eagerly picked up by
prospectors and operators and
there is no choice left now but
the ground far back from any
communication.

The Guggenheims have already
done some work at Alice Arm and
will carry on this spring. Don
Cameron, who achieved no little
amount of publicity over the re-
cent Dolly Varden tangle will op-
erate. The Taylor Mining Co. is
taking in 40 men on May 15 to
work on the Wolf. The Taylor
Company expects to have 60 men
employed at Alice Arm and the
daily shipments will probably
reach 250 tons.

It is reported that the North-
port Smelter will resume opera-
tions after a close down about a
month ago. The last shut down
was due to wage trouble but since
the management showed that they
would stay shut rather than raise
wages the men volunteered to go

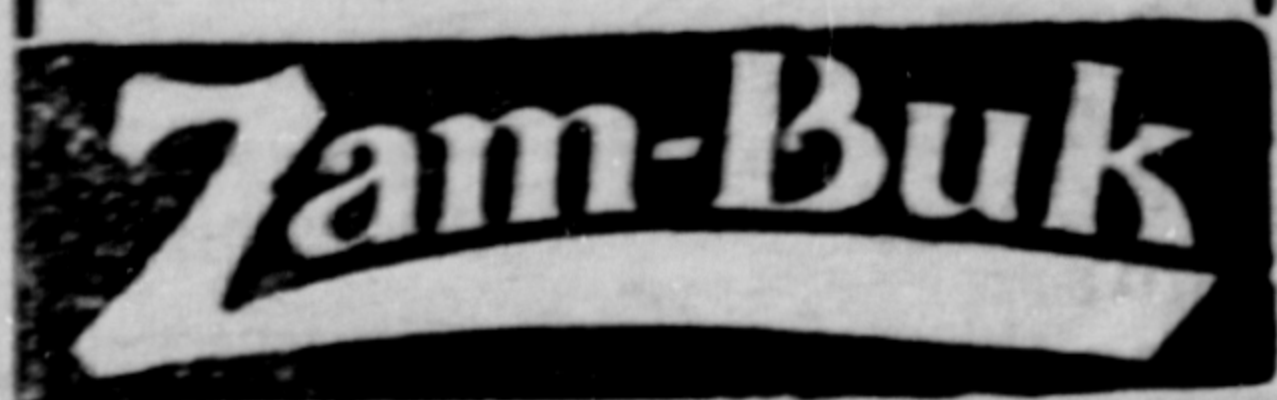

Close to 200,000 acres of land
in Northern Alberta have been
blanketed with applications for
oil and natural gas leases in the
month of February, according to
the records of the Edmonton Do-
minion lands office. Since the
first of February there have been
241 applications filed at the office
for petroleum and natural gas
leases. Two main areas are
covered by the leases taken out
in the past thirty days. The rush
has been for leases covering the
area along the Athabasca River
between the Pelican Rapids and
House River. The next most
popular area has been that around
Birch Lake, south and east of
Innisfae. While these two dis-
tricts have received most atten-
tion from oil seekers, thirty-eight
claims have been filed on tracts
of land around Great Slave Lake,
and eight have been taken out on
the McKenzie River near Bear
Island.
