Synopsis of
Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land
reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to
\$3 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to sur-
veyed lands only.

Pre-emption will be granted covering only
suitable for agricultural purposes
and is non-transferable.

Pre-emption pre-emption abolished.
Parties of not more than four may
apply for adjacent pre-emption.

Joint residence, but each making
improvements on respective
plots.

Pre-emption must occupy claims for
years and make improvements to
the value of \$10 per acre, including clear-
ing and cultivation at least 5 acres,
or receiving Crown Grant.

Pre-emption in occupation not
less than 3 years, and has made pro-
gressive improvements, he may, be-
cause of ill-health, or other cause, be
granted intermediate certificate of im-
provement and transfer his claim.

Pre-emption without permanent resi-
dence may be issued, provided appli-
cant makes improvements to extent of
\$10 per annum and records same each
year.

Failure to make improvements
within 3 years will operate as for-
feiture. Title cannot be obtained in
less than 5 years, and improvements
must be made on 5 acres, including 5 acres
cleared and cultivated, and residence
on at least 2 acres are required.

Pre-emption holding Crown grant
may be sold in conjunction with his
land, without actual occupation, pre-
sumption of improvements made
residence maintained on Crown
land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20
acres may be leased as homesteads
and may be obtained after fulfilling real-
estate and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes
not exceeding 640 acres may be
granted to one person or company.
Other land not exceeding 40 acres
may be purchased; conditions include
natural hay meadows inaccessible
additional upon construction of a road
and, not exceeding half of cost of
road, is made.

PRE-EMPTIONS, FREE GRANTS
ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to
include all persons holding and serv-
ing within which the heirs or devisees
of a deceased pre-emptor may apply
under this Act for one year from the date of
his death, or after the conclusion of the present
war. This privilege is also made re-
spective.

No fee relating to pre-emption is
payable or soldiers on pre-
emption recorded after June 26, 1918.
Provision for return of monies ac-
crued, due and been paid since August
1914, on account of payments, fees
interest on agreements to purchase
land, or of city loans purchased
by Forces, or dependents, acquired
directly or indirectly, remitted from en-
dowment to March 21, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN &
LANDS.**
Provision made for issuance of
Crown grants to sub-purchasers of
land, acquiring rights from
architects, involving forfeiture, on full-
payment and taxes. Where sub-purchaser
does not claim title of original par-
ty, distributed price due and taxes may
be made. Applications must be
made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Provision made for systematic
management of livestock industry pro-
minence under Commission for
annual grazing permits issued based
on numbers raised, priority for estab-
lished owners. Stock-owners may
sell, free, or partially free, permits
to other stock-owners, campers or travellers, up
to 100 head.

MARINE WAYS SOON READY

Only Work Left is Connecting up
of Power and Setting up
Few More Machines.

The opening of the Seal Cove Marine Ways has been slightly delayed but will soon be opened for business, the only thing necessary now being the making of power connections and the setting up of a few more machines. The work is progressing and will be completed shortly. The machinery arrived last week and is all on the ground. It consists of 4 lathes, a drill press, bandsaw and planer, a 15 h. p. and 5 h. p. motor and a large winch. The large cradle is completed and a smaller one, to one side, is being built to accommodate smaller boats so that the big one will always be open to larger boats.

Considerable work is already awaiting the completion of the new plant. One boat is at present there to go on as soon as possible. The tug McCulloch has already had some repairs made and is returning. Six men will be steadily employed at the new plant.

START SOON ON STEWART WHARF

Dolphins are Simply Temporary
Measure to Enable G. T. P.
Boats to Tie Up.

On Friday last the council of the Board of Trade wired Colonel Peck in regard to the report that dolphins were to be driven at Stewart in order to allow the G. T. P. boats to tie up. It was feared that this was to take the place of a new wharf.

Yesterday the commissioner of the Board of Trade received a wire from Colonel Peck stating in effect that the dolphins were simply a temporary measure to allow the steamers to tie up pending the completion of the wharf, which it is expected will be started at once.

Sport Briefs

The work of seconds nowadays alarms the boxers worse than real fighting, according to Tom Dunn, who for years was prominent in ring affairs and travelled with Tommy Ryan, heavyweight boxer. "Why," says he, "just watch one of the seconds work on a boxer between the rounds and see what he does to him. Why, the treatment that is handed to a scrapper now is worse than going through ten rounds of hard fighting. I watched one fellow the other night and just as soon as the boy came to his corner after a tough first round the seconds got busy. One slipped the bottle of smelling salts under his nose, but he didn't need smelling salts any more than I needed a bottle of perfume. Then another second got busy swinging a wet towel in front of him, but the worst of all was what the third helper was doing. This fellow was slapping the fighter on the stomach, pelting him on the chest and back and making it so rough that the boxer had to hold his mouth wide open as he was gasping for breath. Now there wasn't a let-up in that kind of treatment for the full minute of rest time or until the gong clanged starting the second round and when that boy started he was really more tired than when he came to his corner at the end of the real scrapping. I've been watching them handle boys that way for a long time now and it strikes me the handling they got in the corner is a whole lot worse than anything that happens in the actual fight."

WATER NOTICE. DIVERSION AND USE.

TAKE NOTICE that M. P. Olsen, whose address is Alice Arm, B. C., will apply for a licence to take and use 50 cubic feet of water out of Clearwater River which flows southerly and drains into the Kitsault River about 22 miles from the head of the inlet of Alice Arm. The storage-dam will be located near natural outlet of Clearwater Lake. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 450 acre-feet, and it will flood about 50 acres of land. The water will be diverted from the stream at storage dam and will be used for power for mining purposes upon the mine described as the Climax Group.

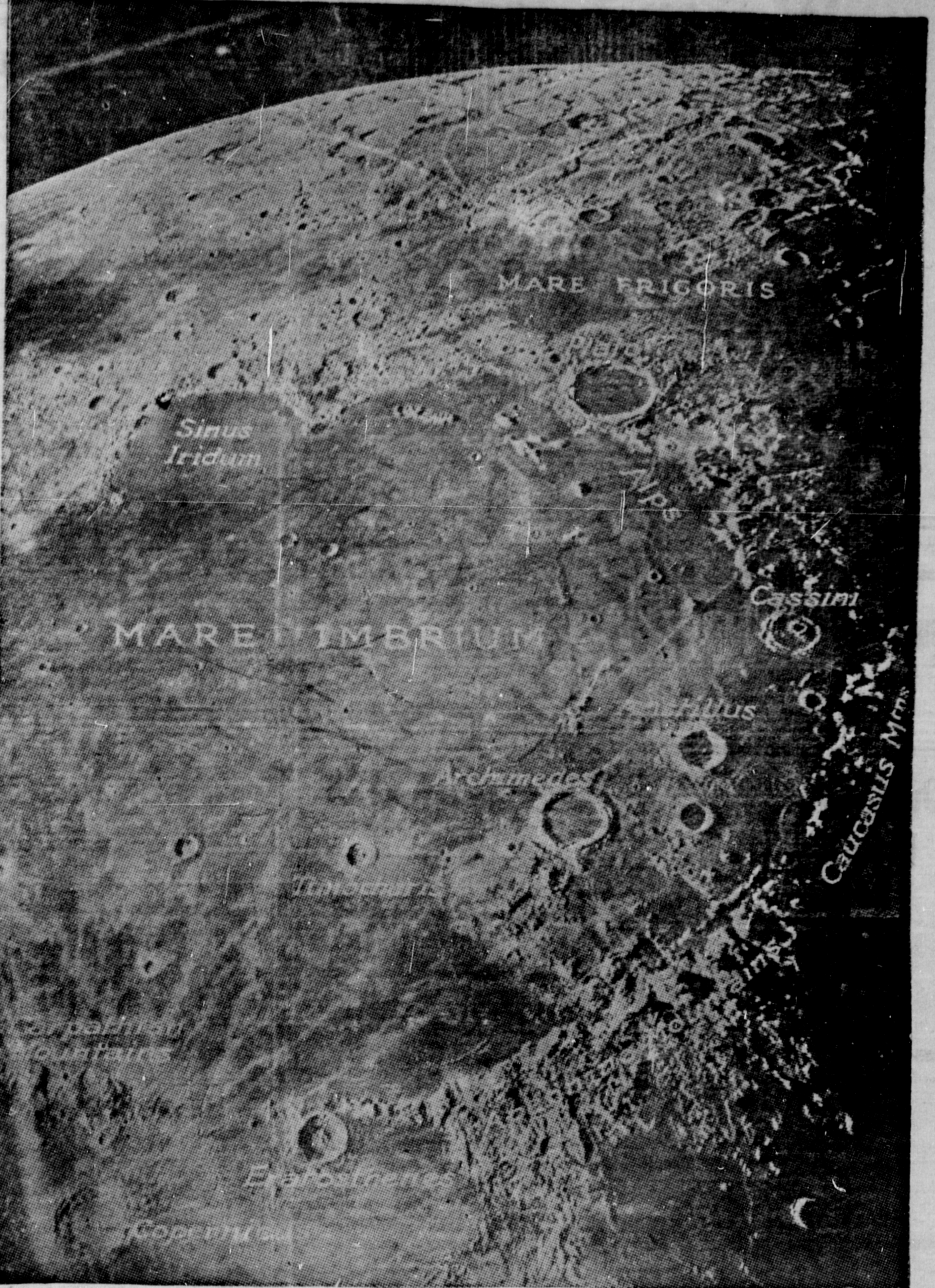

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VIEW OF THE MOON, WHERE VEGETATION IS SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN DISCOVERED.



The above view shows the moon in greater photographic detail than has been possible hitherto. This is due to the size and accuracy of the new Hooker telescope of the Mount Wilson Observatory just installed. The mirror is 100 inches in diameter. The scale of the illustration is a little less than four feet to the moon's diameter. The mountains include the Lunar Apennines and the Alps. Both ranges include many peaks from 15,000 to 20,000 feet in height. The ringlike formations are the so-called craters, most of them far larger than anything similar on the earth. The largest of the conspicuous group of three just below the Apennines is Archimedes, and at the lower end of the Alps is Plato.
