

VIEW OF THE MOON, WHERE VEGETATION IS SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN DISCOVERED.



The above view shows the moon in greater photographic detail than has been possible nitherto. This is due to the size and accuracy of the new Hooker telescope of the Mount Wilson Observatory just installed. The mirror is 100 inches in diameter. The scale of the illustration is a little less that four feet to the moons' diameter. The mountains include the Lunar Appenines and the Alps. Both ranges include many peaks from 15,000 to 20,000 feet in height. The ringlike formations are the so-called craters, most of them tar larger than anything similar on the earth. The largest of the conspicuous group of three just below the Apennines is Archimedes, and at the lower end of the Alps is Plato.
