

POTATOES GOING UP

Last Fall's Early Frost is Given as Reason for the Prices Which are Rising.

Potatoes are rising in price and it is likely that they will keep going up until the new crop arrives. The reason given for the rise is that the early frost of last fall spoiled many crops and the supply will not cover the demand. The thrifty housewife last year, had to use potatoes to eke out the bread through the high cost of flour. Now the situation is reversed.

This is the season where there is little change in the market for fresh fruit and vegetables. The only fruit offered are the staples such as oranges, bananas, lemons and apples. Some of the lines show a slight rise while others have dropped.

PENALTY

Judge Patterson of Philidalphia Raises Ban on Famous Film Showing Armenians.

Declaring that the motion pic- | ture, "Ravished Armenia," better known under the title of "Auction | of Souls," is a film of an educational character, Judge Patterson 35c of Common Pleas Court of Phila-20c delphia, has handed down a de-15c cision overruling the action of 35c the Pennsylvania State Board of 20c Censors, who condemned the pic-35c ture and forbade its showing in 2 10c the State of Pennsylvania.

20c After reviewing the picture 55c himself, Judge Patterson said: 50c "The court finds it a fact and a ! 20c question of law that there is noth-25c ing in the scenes which make 10c them sacrilegious, obscene, in-25c decent or immoral, or of such 25c nature as to tend to debase or oc corrupt morals. Viewing the picture as a whole, the court finds as a fact that it is educational in character. It is not only a vivid portrayal of the story entitled 'Ravished Armenia,' but it is also a picture of conditions as they existed in Armenia a few months ago."
