MARION DAVIES HERE IN

"THE BURDEN OF PROOF"

Marion Davies, in her second
Select Picture, "The Burden of
Proof," will be seen at the West-
holme Theatre tonight for the
first time in this city. "The Bur-
den of Proof" tells a dramatic

IRISHMAN ANSWERED

To the Editor:—

An Irishman falls foul of the
stage representation of what he
calls a caricature of Irish charac-
ter and names a few great Irish-
men whom he thinks are more
typical of that "most distressful
country." His assumption that
Ireland is composed of heroic
characters might go down in Ire-
land and the United States, but I
am afraid that Britons generally
are hardly prepared to accept the
view that St. Patrick drove all the
comedy out of Ireland along with
the snakes and left nothing there
but heroes, saints and martyrs.

His statement that England,
Scotland, France and Germany
never have comic national charac-
ters on the stage, shows that
he has mixed so much with Irish
