MORE CONCERTS
SUNDAY EVES

Arrangements Made Says J. F. Maguire for Series Commencing Easter Sunday.

FAMOUS VIOLINIST
COMING VERY SOON

Financial Plans Outlined by the Promoter—Artists to be Paid But Not Manager.

The following letter has been received from J. F. Maguire relative to future Sunday concerts:

Dear Sir,—A short time ago you announced in your columns that I had made arrangements with the proprietors of the Westholme Theatre for the holding of concerts there every Sunday evening, but in that hurried preliminary announcement a slight mistake was made in stating that "members of the symphony orchestra and other local organizations would all take part."

What I told your representative was that it was my intention to ask those local musicians to assist at the concerts in conjunction with the very best artists obtainable from outside places, nobody being asked to render such service without remuneration. I only refer to this trifling matter because certain local musicians are very indignant at my having, as they think, taken it for granted in advance that they would take part in the concert.

FINANCES.

The arrangement that I made with the theatre is as follows:—The theatre gets 40 per cent of the collection, pay for the house, light, heat, stage help and an orchestra of at least six pieces. I get the remaining 60 per cent with which to pay all other artists, both home and foreign, and all advertising, printing and other accounts.

On each Sunday night I am to announce from the stage the financial details of the previous Sunday night's concert and if there is any balance remaining out of the said 60 per cent it is to be announced and carried on to the next concert and used exclusively for the remuneration of the participating artists and the

other necessary expenses, my own work being entirely gratuitous.

Co-operation.

It will thus be seen that the understanding is thoroughly co-operative as between the promoters and the general public. Every dollar contributed will go into the undertaking, so to speak, and the more the public contributes, the more it will receive in return.

These concerts will be independent of and in addition to any concerts that may be given by the symphony orchestra and any time that organization gives due notice of being ready to give a concert of its own as heretofore the theatre will be available for them.

The Artists.

Some well known outside artists are already engaged and I am corresponding with others in the hope of having, at least, one such every Sunday night. Mrs. D. B. Morkill will sing on Easter Sunday. Miss Izzard, a splendid violinist from London, England, who is taking Vancouver and Victoria by storm just now, will be here as a soloist. On the following Sunday I hope to have Miss Jennie Taggart as soloist. I have heard from her and she will be here if details can be satisfactorily arranged. A little later I hope to announce the engagement of other prominent artists, both vocal and instrumental.

Community Sing.

To give the audience a little extra interest and a participating part, I propose at each concert to throw upon the screen the words of a couple of well-known or sacred songs for the audience to sing, led by the musicians of the evening. And if at any time a well known public speaker happens to be in town on Sunday, I shall endeavor to secure him for an appropriate short address.

The public wants good Sunday concerts and can have them if the necessary support is given, and in my opinion no valid argument against them can be produced. They combine legitimate recreation with educational and uplifting forces. Why not have them?

F. W. Hart is starting the construction of a concrete foundation for a four-storey 25 by 100 foot apartment house on Borden Street one block from the Catholic Church.

Sealed Tenders for the construction of a Timber Bridge across Morse Creek, Second Avenue, City of Prince Rupert, will be received at the office of the City Clerk, Prince Rupert, B. C., until 5 o'clock p.m. Monday, the 19th day of April, 1920.

The Contractor to supply all labour, material and equipment. The work includes, Three Howe Truss Spans, each Seventy-Seven (77) Feet in length, together with the necessary approaches, connections, substructure, concrete footings and excavation. Total length of structure being Six Hundred Feet (600) more or less, and as shown by the plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Engineer, Prince Rupert, B. C.

LAND REGISTRY ACT

(Sections 36 and 134.)

C., as owner in fee under a Tax Sale Deed from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 19th day of July, 1918, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot Seven (7), Block forty-one (41), Section Eight (8), (Map 923). You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by publication in the Daily News), and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:
