Relief for Cities Under New Bill.

Under a bill which has been introduced into the Legislature by the Minister of Finance the amusement tax is to be increased very considerably and half of the amount will be given to the cities or municipalities in which it is collected, the amount to be used for the upkeep of schools and hospitals. In addition to this the Government is taking off the provincial poll tax and is giving the cities and municipalities the power to collect a five dollar tax in its place. These two amounts will add very considerably to the revenue of the cities and, while it is nothing like all that was asked, is a valuable concession. It is not clear just how much it will amount to in Prince Rupert, but it will be enough to help

Other Changes In Tax Collections.

Another change which is being made by the Provincial Government in connection with the collection of taxes is the placing of a graduated tax on automobiles in place of the present ten dollar flat rate on all cars. This tax will still go into the provincial treasury but will be used for the construction of trunk roads. Unhappily Prince Rupert is so situated that at present she gets no benefit from these trunk roads except when citizens visit the outside. It will, however, be an advantage to the province to have the roads. The change in the form of the tax will not

affect Prince Rupert very considerably as most of the cars here

Unearned Increment Tax Proposed.

The Minister of Finance is proposing to impose a tax on unearned increment. Those who receive income through no effort of their own but simply through the increase of value of natural resources will have to pay the Government a part of the increase. This is in line with the most advanced ideas in taxation and will in all probability meet with general approval. It is so far only a suggestion, but if it meets with the approval of the people it is to be assumed it will be adopted in the near tuture.

Dual Income Tax

To Be Discussed.

The Minister of Finance proposes discussing with the Dominion Government the question of income tax with a view to preventing the duplication of work, and also the duplication of forms to be filled in. It takes an immense lot of work in a business house getting out all these forms, and is one of the considerable expenses to be considered in conducting a business. Between the queries from the industrial department and from the tax collecting department, one person is kept busy a good deal of the time. If Mr. Hart can relieve the business people from part of this work it will be worth a great deal to them and Prince Rupert, B. C., as owner in fee will tend to keep down the cost of living.
