Harry Hanson's Patent

Patent Office, Ottawa, January 27, 1920. Sir,-I am directed to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 17th inst. on the subject of Canadian patent No. 162632, granted to you on the 18th May, 1915, for a "Water Heater" and in reply to inform you that this patent was not made subject to the conditions of Section 44 of the Patent Act, (compulsory licence system) and is governed by Section 38 of the said Act, an extract from which I beg to enclose herewith.

I am also to inform you that the fee for the second six years term has not yet been paid, but it does not come due until the 18th May, 1921. The required amount is \$20.00 and a covering letter referring to the patent by date and number, and stating the purpose for which the remittance is made is all that will be necessary.

PROBABLY WAS SUICIDE CASE

Alice Arm Miner Mysteriously Left Hospital and Not Seen Since; O. B. U. Protest.

OWNER OF ESPERANZA AND OTHERWISE WEALTHY

A delegation from the Central Labor Council consisting of J. H. Burrough (spokesman), S. V. Cox and Fred. Shaw appeared before the city council last night to protest the action of the authorities in the matter of the disappearance of Baldemero Salinas, a Spaniard of Alice Arm and owner of the Esperanza mine there.

From the story of the delegation it would appear that Salinas had been an inmate of the hospital and was mentally deranged. On March 2 he left the institution and has since disappeared. He was seen on Hays Creek bridge acting in a strange manner and talking about committing suicide. His friends are afraid that he has! taken this action. The point protested is that his leaving the hospital was not reported.

Not on Record.

Alderman McLennan, who is a member of the Hospital Board, told that his entry at the hospital had not indicated that he was mentally unbalanced. The doctor may have known this but as there was nothing on the hospital records to show it the hospital officials could not be held responsible. He had been in the habit of sleeping at the hospital and going out during the day, sometimes staying till evening. When he had finally left and not returned there was not much notice taken of it.

Suggested Neglect-

Ald. Casey stated that he understood that the doctor knew of his mental state. It had been reported by his friend Gomez. There was no question as to his mental disability, as people had noticed it in the hospital and prior to his going there. In Kact the man giving way. Ald. Casey thought it was gross neglect to not report the matter and it was wrong to give him unrestricted liberty. To let him disappear without reporting it was the protest of the delegation and he would join in it-

The alderman also stated that he had been seen to attempt to jump over Hays Creek bridge one evening at 9 o'clock. He had an estate of \$3,400 cash and also mining interests. The thing should be brought to a head.

Serious Matter.

Mayor McClymont remarked on the seriousness of the matter, Probably no one was responsible at the hospital. It was news to him that there were any cases of this nature there. He ordered the matter to be investigated by the members of the hospital committee, Aldermen Murray and Mc-Lennan. The official administrator is to be notified.
