SALMON RIVER RAILWAY WILL COMMENCE NOW

Charles F. Caldwell, Enthusiastic Mining Man, is Responsible For the Statement.

C. F. Caldwell, president of the Portland Canal Railroad and Terminal Co., makes the statement that work will, in all probability, commence this spring on the building of a railroad from Hyder to a distance of twenty miles up the Salmon River Valley opening up all the rich mineral belt included in that district. He has just returned from a trip to Washington, D. C., where the titles for the right of way for the 12 miles in Alaskan territory have been perfected. The new road will be of standard gauge.

Mr. Caldwell is a strong advocate of the remonetization of silver on a ten to one basis, which would place it at a standard government guaranteed value of \$2 per ounce. This issue, Mr. Caldwell says he is confident, will be settled at the Seattle mining convention to be held soon.

Mr. Caldwell is an old timer of the Kootenays and other mining fields and breathes a spirit of optimism wherever he goes. He has been responsible for many statements that the public have looked at with a certain amount of doubt. "What do I care if they say some more of Caldwell's hot air?" he said to a News representative. "I believe in boosting even if Caldwell does get two words and the country one. And, at that I believe Caldwell does more good for the country than the camp knockers who want to keep all the good things under cover to grab them at their own prices. Caldwell never made money that way."

Mr. Caldwell left for Stewart on the Prince Albert on Thursday afternoon and returned to town today. He has large interests in the Stewart district. Up to recently he was president of the Forty-Nine Mine Co. and is now a director. He is also interested in the Premier Gold Mines.

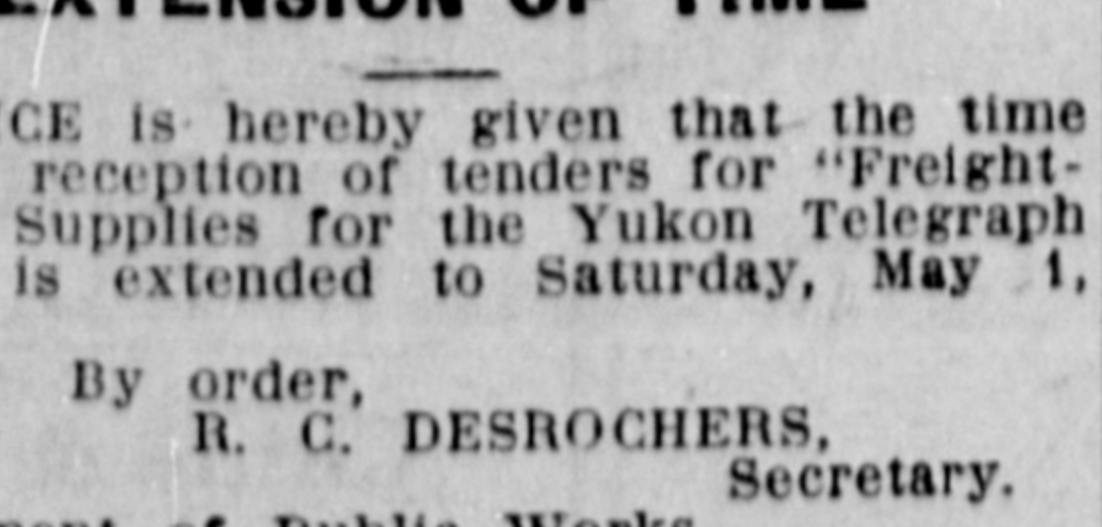

GOOD PRICES AT MONTREAL SALE

Silver Fox Sold at 780 a Skin; Other Prices Vary.

At the Montreal fur sale the offering of 3,400 marten brought \$191,019. Highest price, \$201; lowest price, \$18.00. The bidding was spirited and interesting, New York being the cause of this. The average price was \$56.50.

109 Russian sables brought \$25,303. High, \$390.06; low, \$145.00; average price \$232.15.

275 stone marten, only three lots, sold at \$38.50.

6,703 red fox brought \$110,173. High \$51.00; low, \$5. Average, \$19.55—a very good collection and an advance of 30 per cent. over St. Louis.

4,353 wombats brought \$10,066. High, \$2.50; low \$1.45.

5,226 wallaby and kangaroo brought \$21,551. High, \$6.00; low, 80c.

43,000 raccoons brought \$214,271. High—three lots brought \$30, \$20, and \$18. Low, \$5. The advance over St. Louis was about five per cent. Very spirited bidding, New York being the cause of this.

Marten did not advance, but held at St. Louis prices.

All advances were quoted in American money, and rate of exchange for Canadian advance.

Of cross fox skins 136 lots disposed of by single skins and pairs for the sum of \$36,289, bringing the total number of lots for the sale up to 1,360 and the sales to \$1,860,586.

In silver fox, the first pair of skins taken by C. G. Gunther, of New York, at \$780 a skin. There are 730 skins offered in this fur.
