MAYENCE, April 6.—French troops entered Frankfort and mstadt at five o'clock this morning, encountering no resistfrom German Government forces. Only a small German was left in Frankfort as police protection for the people, main body having withdrawn yesterday afternoon and last ing. The German Government garrison of Darmstadt left nidnight to avoid contact with the French and this morning six miles east of the city.

General Degoutte has issued a proclamation to cities and is within the area to be occupied, stating that the French ps have crossed the Rhine to compel the German Government espect its agreement with the Allies and asserting that there o hostile intent toward the people of that region.

The proclamation further says that the French troops will draw as soon as the German Government forces have evacuthe neutral zone. All cities, towns and districts in the ocied area are declared to be in a state of siege.

# Year in Jail for Winnipeg Leaders

Men Convicted of Seditious Conspiracy to serve Twelve Months and Bray Six for being Common Nuisance

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WINNIPEG, April 6 .- One year in jail is the punishment imposed upon the Winnipeg strike leaders convicted on March 27 of seditious conspiracy and committing a common nuisance. Sentence was imposed this morning by Mr. Justice Metcalfe on the six convicted leaders, Rev. William Ivens, W. A. Prichard, R. J. Johns, John Queen and George Armstrong. They were given one year each on six counts of seditions conspiracy and six months for being a common nuisance, the sentence to run concurrently.

R. E. Bray was sentenced to six months in jail for being a common nuisance.


