#### All Unite in One Organization.

There is one organization in the city in which all the business and professional men may unite with benefit to themselves and the city. That organization is the Board of Trade. It is the most live civic organization we have. While the members of the city council are the paid servants of the people, the members of the Board of Trade pay out their own money in order to further the interests of the community.

At a recent meeting of the Board, President Parker referred to the need of still greater interest in the proceedings of that institution. It seems that there are still a few people who make their living here, and yet refuse to join the organization. They sit back and criticize the lack of initiative of the Board but do nothing themselves. They do not deserve success, and Kismet will take care of them.

Mention was also made at the meeting of the large number of members, who while willing to contribute the regular fee to the organization, do not turn out to meetings and try to help with their personal effort. It is useless to scold, because people do not do these things. President Parker did not do that. It is wise, however, to draw attention to the condition at times with a view to a remedy.

#### Need of Unity

##### During Growing Period.

There never was a time in the history of Prince Rupert when the need of unity was so apparent as it is today. The citizens can do so much toward making the city prosperous, that it is curious that there should be any holding back from these co-operative efforts. It is not much to ask for an hour or two once a month or a few minutes now and then for service on a committee. Time spent in this way will bring big results to the community including the individual members.

#### Many Views on Various Subjects.

The community is divided into various groups. In religion there are a dozen divisions; in politics there are several divisions, in social life the divisions are many. There is, however, a common interest outside of all these. It is the communal interest, the interest of mutual advantage. The Board of Trade is a point of union for all who expect advantage from the growth and improvement of the city, and any who hang back from giving it support are weakening the effort of the body.

Naturally there are differences of opinion as to matters of policy in the Board of Trade. There will always be differences, but business men should be big enough to be able to give and take and allow for all such differences. The main thing is that the mass movement is in the right direction. Those who think that the Board is being run by a clique should at once get out to the meetings and break up the clique. It is the easiest thing in the world. All that is necessary is a little effort.

#### Officers Give

##### Good Deal of Time.

The officers of the organization, especially the president, give a great deal of time to the public interest. They have nothing to gain personally more than anyone else gains. They are acting on behalf of the rest of us, and often they get nothing but growls for their pains.

Let us get a new slant on this Board of Trade question. A little steady effort all-round and a little more pocketing of our prejudices and we can make this little city cut a big figure. We need not spend much money, but we can get large results.

#### \*\*\*\*\* PRINCE RUPERT TIDES \*\*\*\*\*

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.
