Settlement of Big Lawsuit.

Prince Rupert people will be very pleased to know that the big lawsuit has been settled, and that now there is a prospect of work going ahead more rapidly at the shipyards and that further contracts may be secured for other ships than those now under construction. Under the general management of E. P Rust and with J. H. Pullsbury as superintendent the work has been making fairly good progress of late. Now there should be an impetus given to the work of construction and Prince Rupert should be a busy place for some time to come.

Townsite Trouble At Hazelton.

The progress of the town of New Hazelton is much impeded by the fact that nearly all the land in the neighborhood is subdivided into townsites and that some of the lots in this have been sold to men who are paying the taxes on them. The result is that something like ten thousand acres of good cultivable land is tied up in such a way that it cannot be cultivated. The condition is disastrous to the community.

Good Steamship Service to Stewart.

The news that Stewart is to get a first class weekly steamship service commencing very soon will be good news to residents Simpson but the time for Prince of that place and to those who will be doing business with the Rupert varies only a few minutes mining town. The table given is for Port on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.
