from playing in prize matches.

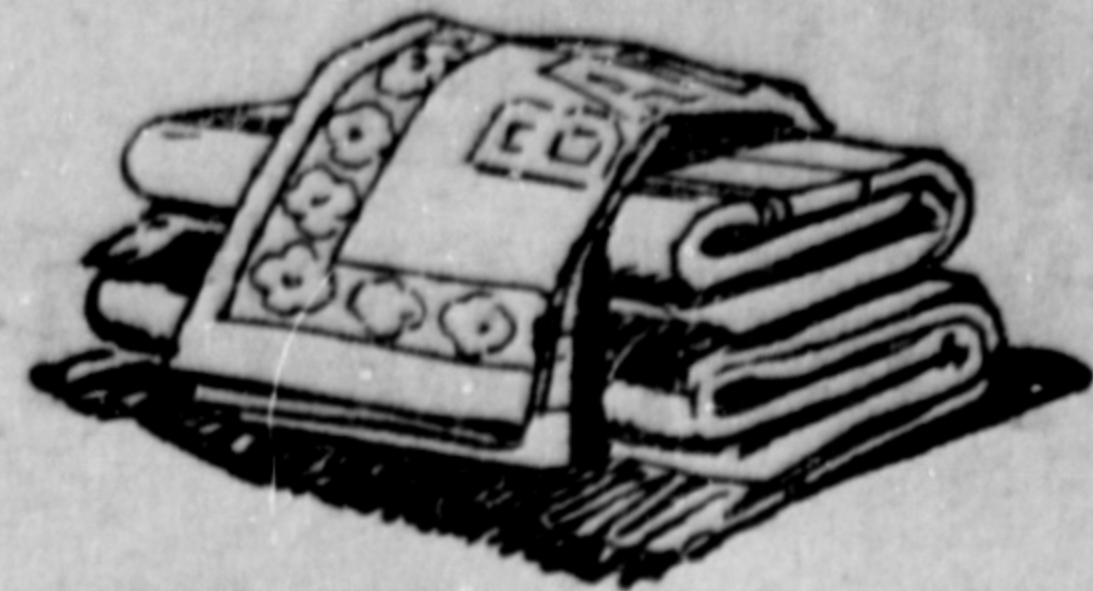
Mordecai Brown, for years star

VICTORIA, April 12.—Atlin  
electoral district will be changed  
to Prince Rupert electoral dis-  
trict, if the amendment intro-  
duced by Hon. T. D. Pattullo,  
minister of lands, is passed. The  
minister pointed out that Prince  
Rupert was the centre of the dis-  
trict, and the name Atlin carried  
a flavor of north winds and cold,  
while such was not the case when  
the district as a whole was con-  
sidered. The climate was mild  
and he felt that the district might  
well be named Prince Rupert.
