GENERAL RAISE IN MEAT PRICES

Sugar Also Takes Another 20
Flier—Butter up as Well.
Late Season.

Owing to increase in wholesale prices, meat at the local butcher shops has taken another jump of about 5c per pound. Butter has also advanced and on Saturday morning word was received in the city by wire that sugar had increased 2c per pound.

Though this is the time of the year when butter should be on the downward trend, the spring season is so late that instead of commencing to go down, it is going the other way. The prairie pastures are not yet open, but when the cattle get on green food the price of butter will go down.

Green stuff is just beginning to appear. Last week California green onions were offered for the first time this season. White salmon and crabs are again being offered.
