**WATER NOTICE**  
USE AND STORAGE

Take notice that the Taylor Mining Co., Ltd., whose address is 607 Credit Foncier Building, Vancouver, B. C., will apply for a licence to take and use 50 second feet, and to store 2500 acre feet of water out of Clearwater Creek, tributary to Kitsault River, which flows westerly and drains into Kitsault River about 23 miles north of Alice Arm, B. C.

The storage-dam will be located at outlet of Clearwater Lake. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 2500 acre feet, and it will flood about 200 acres of land. The water will be diverted from the stream at a point close to lake outlet and will be used for power purposes upon the mine described as Wolf Mineral Claim, and lights to Alice Arm District.

**Local News Notes**

Mr. and Mrs. H. Wearne, of Telkwa, are registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

George Blane arrived in the city from Sandon on the Prince Rupert yesterday noon.

J. L. Nygaard, a Bella Coola farmer, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert yesterday.

A. D. Yorke returned last night from a trip up the Eostall River for the Granby Bay Company.

George McAfee, manager of the Georgetown sawmill, was an arrival from the south yesterday.

Just arrived! Shipment of 500 tons of New Wellington coal; also large shipment of double dressed fir, doors, windows, flooring, etc.

Tuesday night's passenger train is reported for arrival here at 3:30 this afternoon. Tonight's regular train is five and a half hours late.

The Silver Spray sold 1,400 lbs. of red and 600 lbs. of white salmon to the Pacific Fisheries this morning at 17.9c and 8c. The First Place sold 600 lbs. red and 300 lbs. white to the Cold Storage at 18c and 8c.

Mrs. Belle Ward, who was recently sent down to Okalla to serve six months for selling liquor, has been released. The conviction was not reversed but the prisoner is merely out on parole as a clemency measure.

The docket for the spring assize at Prince Rupert which has been set for June 16 appears light, there being but two criminal cases, those of Duff and Richard Leachy for theft. There are four or five divorce actions slated.

**FISHERIES OF CANADA ARE VERY VALUABLE**

Two of World's Most Important Fishing Grounds are off Her Coast.

Evidence that the most enthusiastic amateur fisherman is pitifully lacking in imagination compared with the confirmed statistician, is provided by Captain F. W. Wallace, of Montreal, writing in the Journal of the Canadian Bankers' Association. Where his amateur rivals deal in ounces, Captain Wallace speaks calmly of hundreds of millions of pounds.

"According to the latest available statistics," he says, "the value of Canada's fisheries amounted to \$52,350,000. Of this amount, British Columbia claims a fishery value of \$21,518,595, or 41 per cent. of the total. The annual value of the fisheries in the other provinces are as follows:—

"These figures are based upon the value of the fish as landed on the dock—the price paid to the first handlers—the fishermen and by no means represents the total value of the prepared product, which, of course, varies according to the class of preparation and the labor expended on it. At the present time, about 100,000 persons are engaged directly in our fisheries and the capital invested is between thirty-six and thirty-eight million dollars."

The size of the fleet engaged in this work he gives as follows:—200 steam vessels; 1,300 sail and motor driven vessels of the larger size; 14,000 small motor boats, and 27,000 sail and row boats—a total of 42,500.

The figures for weight are quite as impressive. Cod are given as totalling 180,000,000 pounds per year; salmon, more than 147,000,000 pounds. Of the latter, 80,000,000 cars were packed and shipped in Canada during 1918.

"The world's most important fishing grounds are only four in number," the writer concludes, "and all lie in the northern hemisphere and mainly north of the fortieth parallel of latitude. Out of these four prolific fishing areas Canada is singularly fortunate in having two adjacent to her Atlantic and Pacific coasts, and is thus endowed with the greatest fishery resources in the world."
