complete the railway to Prince George.

Co-operation.

"The Co-operative Society legislation was consolidated and revised, it being introduced into the house by the minister of agriculture, Hon. E. D. Barrow, as was also the Agricultural Society Act. Amendments to the Land Settlement Act which brought such revolution to land settlement in the province was also introduced by the minister. A comprehensive report presented by the select committee on agriculture was also adopted. Each session sees more and more attention paid to agriculture in the house.

"From the attorney-general's department emanated amendments to the Prohibition Act restricting the quantity that may be given for prescriptions to eight ounces, limiting the number of prescriptions per month and abolishing permits. In speaking to the amendments, Hon. Mr. Farris made it clear that if the province was to have a prohibition act it should be such a one to enable its administration to be put beyond reproach.

Plebiscite in August.

"At the same time the successful administration depends on substantial public opinion. The present act was under a cloud so, to clearly settle it, a bill was brought in calling for a plebiscite in August as to whether the people wanted prohibition or the sale of liquor under government control in sealed packages. After that, the province may go further and ask the Dominion for a plebiscite on the importation question.

"The last 24 hours of the session was somewhat dramatic. R. T. Elliott, K.C., of Victoria, recently applied to Ottawa for disallowance of last session's Dolly Varden Railway Bill which was refused. On April 12, thirteen months after the bill had been passed, writs were issued against the Taylor Engineering Co. and its associates on behalf of the Dolly Varden Mines Co. Previous to the issuing of the writs the government had been considering legislation vesting the railway and mine in the Taylor company.

"Included in the important legislation brought down through the attorney-general's department were the Game Amendment Act and the Testator's Family Maintenance Act. The latter provides for better care of families after the death of the heads regardless of wills.

Abusive Telegram.

"On the eve of prorogation, Mr. Elliott, in an attempt to frighten the Premier, sent a most abusive telegram of 1 1/2 pages stating the Taylor people had carried on improper lobbying for further legislation. It was 11:30 at night when this message was received and the Premier read it to the house and introduced the vesting legislation. He treated the telegram with the contempt it deserved.

"In the morning a telegram even more abusive and threatening was received from Mr. Elliott but it was of no avail for the Socialists, Soldiers and lady member joined with the government in passing the bill vesting the

It was pointed out that the government did not propose to stand to one side for a firm that had slept on its rights for thirteen months if the action of the legislature could assist in making more certain the operation of the road at Alice Arm which serves a dozen properties in the process of development.

"In a way the session was a tragic one. The death of Mr. Mobley was received by the house with much regret and later the death of Mr. Fell, K.C., clerk for 33 successive sessions in the house, removed a figure that was valued and respected indeed.

Partizan Views.

"It was a long and hard session and the opposition was not bitter although Mr. Bowser, at times, gave vent to his partizan views. The soldiers supported the government in nearly all its legislation and one feels that the work done at the fourth session of this parliament was characterized by much that will be of considerable amount of good to the citizens of British Columbia."
