

CANNOT UNDERSTAND PRINCE RUPERT FOLK

Col. McMillan, of Cassiar Packing Co., Says Not Directly Interested in Salmon.

Speaking of the persistence of the Prince Rupert people in having the new fishery regulations strictly enforced, Col. McMillan, of the Cassiar Packing Co., owners of the Cassiar Cannery on the Skeena, remarked recently that it was difficult to understand the stand of Prince Rupert people who are in favor of the open-fishing regulations inaugurated this year.

Col. McMillan also voiced the anxiety of the cannery people regarding the feared invasion of the salmon fisheries of B. C. by Americans. He also said that of 30 or more canneries on the Fraser River only two would operate this year.

On the recommendation of the Board of Works and the City Engineer, 36 feet of sewer pipe is to be supplied to C. B. Anderson Co., Eighth St., so that he may connect up with the city sewer.

Salmon Canning is Very Important Industry with 28 Plants in Operation

Six Thousand People to be Employed and Should Support Population of 20,000 in vicinity of Prince Rupert

Now that the salmon canning season is about to commence a resume of the industry in the district tributary to Prince Rupert will not be out of place. Few people realize the large extent of the business tributary to the city in the canning of salmon in the Skeena, Naas and Queen Charlotte districts. Last year a total of 1,017,491 cases were packed in these districts with a value that reached nearly \$10,000,000. The industry is the means of employment of 6,000 persons which would support a population of at least 20,000. This season there will be 28 canneries operating in the immediate vicinity of Prince Rupert.

Closest to the city, with the exception of the Prince Rupert Cannery, owned by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., are the Skeena River canneries. The Skeena River district is the largest of all. In it there are no less than 14 canneries operating. The employees total 1400 persons. The largest is the Balmoral Cannery at the mouth of the Estall River on the east side. This plant is owned by the B.C. Packers of Vancouver. The other canneries are smaller and their outputs are about the same size.

Location of Canneries

Following the line of the G.T.P. out of Prince Rupert the first cannery is the Port Edward owned by the Northern B.C. Fish Co. of Vancouver, in which George Frizzell and R. V. Winch are largely interested. Next comes the Inverness Cannery, owned by J. H. Todd & Co., which is being rebuilt after the recent fire. Across the Slough from Inverness is the Dominion Cannery owned by the B.C. Packers. In sight of Inverness and on the river come Sunnyside, Gosse-Millerd Co. and North Pacific, owned by the A.B.C. Packers. Past this is the Cassiar Cannery owned by the Cassiar Packing Co. At Haysport a new cannery will be operated this year, owned by the Maritime Fisheries. This is the last cannery on the north side of the Skeena with the exception of the old Aberdeen Cannery which was destroyed by fire years ago.

Almost directly across from the old Aberdeen is the Estall River and the Balmoral Cannery. At Port Essington there are three canneries, the British American, owned by the A.B.C. Packers, the Skeena Commercial, the Northern B.C. Packers and Gunningham Cannery, the property of the B.C. Packers. West of Essington and at the gap of the Skeena River is the Carlisle Cannery owned by the Kildala Packing Co. Across from this on Smith Island is the Oceanic Cannery belonging to the B.C. Canning Co. of Victoria. At Claxton is the cannery of the Wallace Fisheries. This list comprises all the canneries of the Skeena, except the B.C. Packers' Alexander Cannery, near Balmoral, which is not operating this year.

Down the coast from the Skeena River and in Queen Charlotte Islands are the Butedale Cannery, belonging to the Western Packers, and the Joyce Lake Cannery of the B.C. Packers Co.

Queen Charlotte

On the Queen Charlotte Islands are five plants, which are not so extensive as the ones on the mainland and pack more intermittently. These are the Lockport Cannery, owned by the Lockport Canning Co. of the Alford Bay Cannery, by the Maritime Fisheries, the Camishewa Cannery, by J. M. McMillan; the Masset Inlet Cannery, by the Wallace Fisheries; and the Laxenburg Cannery, belonging to Captain Balmington and associates. The last mentioned is the only cannery that has ever operated during the winter in this district, which it was busy canning crabs. The mild winter station at Langara, owned last year by C. P. Riell, may not operate this season.

Naas River

In the Naas River district there will be six canneries in operation this season. On the island in this region, which is called the M. Cannery, belonging to the M. Fisheries Co. of the mouth of the Naas, and the Portland Cannery, the well known spruce plant, belonging to the A. B. C. Packers Co. Just up from the mouth are the Mail Bay, owned by the B. C. Packers, and Naas Harbor, by the B. C. Packers. On Smith Island is the cannery of that name

owned by the Western Salmon Packers and close by the Kumeon Cannery, belonging to the Northern B. C. Fisheries. One cannery, the Port Nelson, owned by the A. B. C. Packing Co., will not operate this season.

The Seasons.

None of the canneries can commence operations to any extent before May 1 when the licenses are granted. The first fish to be taken ad-canned are the springs which run from May 1 to July 15. On or before June 20, the sockeye, the greatest of commercial fish, commences to run and the canning season commences in earnest. They continue till the end of August. When the humpbacks start about July 15, the canneries are working their hardest with the various varieties coming in. The cohoes and chums commence to run about August 1 and continue till September 30 when the season is practically over.

At the present time all the canneries are busy preparing for the season's work, organizing staffs and getting in supplies for the villages of Japs and Indians, as well as whies that will gather about each one. The majority do not start canning until June 20 although the Balmoral starts putting up mild cured springs about May 1. Until May 1 the only fish that can be taken at the plants are those brought in by trolling boats.

STEWART

After having used the jail quarters in the court house for school purposes for some years, the school has again opened in the regular large schoolhouse with Miss Dorothy Thompson in charge.

Last Saturday night the Stewart Athletic Association met and made plans for a baseball team this season. Stewart possesses a number of strong players and it is expected will make a good showing in inter-town matches.

At an election held in the court house on Friday morning last, James Stewart, William Fraser and Martin Smith were elected fire wardens for the year. A strict campaign for fire-protection is to be followed this year. Tents will be prohibited in the business section and stopovers and change-houses are to be examined.

Last Saturday night a large crowd attended the opening of the F. M. St. Gabriel. Two percent and music quickly whittled the time away. Another cabaret, the Ocean View, is opening shortly.

There is still a good deal of snow in the hills but the operating camps are working satisfactorily and recent indications would promise that the snow will disappear quickly once it gets started.

F. M. Hutchinson, head of the Chalmers Land Co., appeared on the streets of Victoria a few days ago in overalls. His idea he says is to beat the H. C. of L. and he expects others to follow his lead.
