Step Forward in National Development.

Step by Step Canada is moving forward toward the status of full nationhood. The latest move to have a direct consular representative at Washington is one that has excited some comment both in Europe and on this continent. The Seattle Times dealing with the subject editorially says:

"The neighboring Dominion is seeking 'recognition' from the United States as a separate and sovereign nation."

"It desires to establish independent diplomatic relations with this republic, with the dispatch, to Washington, of a minister."

"Its aspiration is declared not to be opposed by Great Britain and only the formal consent of the United States is necessary to a realization of its hopes."

The appearance at Washington of a Canadian minister will be followed, it is predicted, by the stationing there of diplomatic representatives by Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India.

"If any or all of the self-governing British Dominions desire to send their own ministers to the United States, there is no visible reason why this country should object."

"The matter is one which primarily concerns them and Great Britain. If there is agreement in the Empire on this course, no reason suggests itself that would justify a refusal on the part of America to receive these diplomats."

"There is no question as to the stability of the Canadian government. Any minister who might be named would be the spokesman for a government as sturdy and as well-grounded as our own."

"That this procedure constitutes an innovation in the conduct of the British Empire's foreign affairs is a matter of only passing interest to this country."

"Whenever Canada knocks and asks admission to the sisterhood of sovereign states, whether now or later, America certainly should be among the first to welcome it."

Back to jail to Escape Living Costs.

The story of the man in the United States who scaled the walls of the penitentiary in order to get back into his cell where he could escape the high cost of living, is a pretty little tale but it illustrates a big truth. It shows what extremes the prices of everything have gone and it should be a warning that things cannot remain so. Already there is a tightening of the money market and no one can say how long the present condition will last.

Naturally people are uneasy at the abnormal conditions. It is natural that workingmen should be worried and the employers should be timid. No one knows what is going to happen tomorrow, commercially. There is no reason to be fearful, only careful. It must always be borne in mind that the present condition cannot last very long.

Lumber Industry Important Here.

The lumber industry is very important to this place. Not only have we our own big mill and the mill at Georgetown, but all up the line there are a string of sawmills that circulate a lot of money and help to make business. On the Queen Charlotte Islands, too, there are a number of mills running and they are all tributary to Prince Rupert.

In today's News F. L. Buckley tells of his big mill at Buckley Bay and he still has an idea of further extensions in the way of a re-saw plant and box factory not far from here. All these things help to make the place busy.

Mining News

SILVER CAP BONDED

George J. Hammond, president of the Natural Resources Exploration Co. of Vancouver, has made the first payment of the \$50,000 bond on the Silver Cap Group of Alice Arm and for the past two weeks a crew of men have been working on the ground. Those associated with the enterprise state that the values of the claim run very high, some picked samples running 900 ounces to the ton. The Silver Cap was discovered by Walter Walker, of Alice Arm.

Busy at Nome.

Mining in the Nome section has been active this year according to the Nome Nugget. Upwards of 20 outfits were engaged during the winter prospecting or mining within a radius of 15 miles of the far north town. Some of them are working on pay dirt but the majority of them are looking for the elusive pay streak in what are considered likely spots. Among the scenes of operation are Penny Creek, Cripple River, Jess Creek, Sonora Creek, Sunset Creek, Monumen Creek, Rock Creek, Glacier Creek, Anvil Creek, Triple Creek, Grass Gulch and Dry Creek.

Princeton Platinum.

"The Tulameen River near Princeton in the Similkameen country is the platinum centre in British Columbia," says John P. McConnell, the Sun mining writer, "and if the deposits were worked would probably make a world's record of production. The development of the industry in that district would necessitate development work of great extent."
