a number of women, confessed late last night that he had murdered two of them, and according to the officers, he made a partial confession of the murder of two others. The confessions were made to Thomas Lee Wolwine, district attorney, and other officials.

The officers said that Huirt stated: "He might have murdered more" but in his weakened condition, resulting from two attempts at suicide, he could not remember.

The murderer also declared, according to the officers, that he had married "twelve or fifteen women, probably more," but he was too weak to give details. Huirt confessed to having murdered Nina Lee Deloney and Betty Pryor, the former with a hammer near Long Beach, California, and the latter by crushing her lead with a sledge hammer near Plum Station, Washington.

He made a "partial confession," the officers said, of murders of Bertha Goodnich and Alice Ludvigson, the former, the officers tated, he tipped out of a boat on Lake Washington near Seattle and the latter he drowned in a river in Idaho.

The officers stated, however, that Huirt's actual words in connection with the death of these two were "killed by accident."
