

RATTENBURY AND OVERALLS

Wants Victoria City Council and Civic Employees to Don Cheap Attire.

VICTORIA, April 29.—F. M. Rattenbury, described to the committee as the "leading spirit in the overall movement," appeared before Chairman George Sangster and members of the City Council's Streets Committee yesterday afternoon, and told them that the adoption of denim by the citizens as a whole as everyday attire would pull down the cost of living and possibly be a means of averting revolution and bloodshed.

Mr. Rattenbury asked that the committee should back him up in his overall campaign, suggested the appointment of an aldermanic committee to encourage the wearing of overalls by City Hall employees and, in short, to set an example for the community.

The aldermen were not moved. After asking a few questions, they referred Mr. Rattenbury to the Civic Employees' Protective Association, but that did not close the interview. The novelty of Mr. Rattenbury's plea made the conference of unusual interest, but the climax was not reached until Alderman Sangster declared:

Waste of Time

"You've got overalls on. Now get out and dig; start production, and don't waste your time telling people how to dress."

Mr. Rattenbury in addressing the the Council spoke of the gravity of world economic conditions, and said that the increasing cost of living was providing fuel for revolutionary fires. He declared that the extensive wearing of overalls seemed to point a way out of the difficulty, because overalls were not costly, and they lasted three times as long as other clothes. Old clothes would not do, because they would not last, he said.

"But what can we do to help?" asked Ald. Patrick.

"Form a committee of five to get the city employees to sign on; back up the movement," suggested Mr. Rattenbury.

"I think you would be better spending your time if you got out and encouraged people to raise something and in that way kept the cost of living down," said Ald. Sanster. "It's simply a waste of time—this talk about overalls. If you went out and dug potatoes it would be a lot better. Induce the people to dig up their back lots."

Mr. Rattenbury smiled, and proposed a bargain. If the Council would appoint an overall committee, he would urge the denim donors to grow potatoes.

"We don't interfere with the dress worn by the employees," said Ald. Patrick. "You had better see their association."

"But you represent the people," protested Mr. Rattenbury. "Why don't you set an example?"

"I've got enough old clothes to last a lifetime," Ald. Patrick divulged; "but I don't object to city employees wearing overalls if they want to. It is up to the individual."

Then Chairman Sangster started the cross-fire which finally brought the interview to an abrupt close.

AEROPLANE SERVICE OUT OF DETROIT

Two Airships to be Used Flying to Toronto and Buffalo.

DETROIT, Mich., April 30.—Promoters of the United States Air Express Company, which will start a regular aerial service between this city and Cleveland, announce that the initial "hop-off" has been set for May 2.

Two giant navy planes obtained from the Government have arrived here, and are being got in readiness for the work they will have to do. The ships are of the J-5 L type, with a wing-stretch of 104 feet, two outside engines and comfortable passenger compartments with every convenience with wireless telephones.

The ships will have a cruising radius of 100 hours at a speed of 110 miles an hour. The rate of fare to Cleveland will be \$20 one way, and the time for the trip one hour. Four other ships of the same type have also been contracted for, and will be used for the Detroit-Toronto and Detroit-Buffalo routes.

He plans to send his rubber shoe agents to each city in the big circuit to drive the gamblers out. Each club has been furnished with a list of notorious offenders who will be denied admission. The magnates also will keep certain players under close surveillance.
