More Improvements At Salt Lakes.

The warmer weather is making the young people look across the harbor in the direction of the Salt Lakes. It is rousing the Swimming Club and making them consider the season's activities. Last year a big effort was made and the result was the making of substantial improvements at the swimming resort. This year there is some work to be done. The beach should certainly be improved in order to give the younger people an opportunity to learn to swim. When the dredging is going on at Metlakatla it is possible a scow load or two of sand could be diverted to the Salt Lake, where it would make the shallow splash pond much more inviting. The Swimming Club may depend upon the people backing them in any efforts they make to improve the lake.

Came Through Game Without a Penalty.

The Winnipeg "Falcons," the team that made the big clean up at Antwerp, played through the winning game without a penalty against them. That is a great record. It is the kind of record of which any team may be proud. To play the game and play it clean; to win if possible, and to lose rather than play unfairly; that is true sport.

Canada is following along British lines in going in for clean sport. There is nothing trickier or unfair about the best British sportsmen. The same may be said of Canadians. They give the best that is in them, but scorn to win by anything but straightforward methods. It is a great aim, to be able to go through a game without deserving a penalty.

Vandals Destroy Flowers in City.

It is reported that vandals, ruffians, or whatever name might be given to men who would do such a deed, have deliberately destroyed flowers growing on the government lawns. These lawns are kept up by the provincial government especially for the benefit of the people of this city and they form one of the show spots here. From them visitors are able to gather an idea what may be done in the way of gardening. To have the flowers deliberately pulled up and carried away is a criminal action of the worst kind.

It seems a pity that in so many communities there are people who seem to delight in destroying things. Prince Rupert it seems has at least one of those people and the sooner he is behind the bars the better for the place.

Mountain Climbing As a Sport.

Someone inquires why there is not more mountain climbing done here. In answer we say that it must be because the people here prefer some other kind of sport. There are a few people who regularly climb to the top of Kaien Mountain and who now and then reach the summit of Morse. There are in sight of the city, however, snow-clad mountains that would be a better test of a climber's mettle. Up the inlet in the direction of Port Simpson there are rather lofty peaks that are covered with snow practically all the year round. We do not lack mountains, what is needed is a group of climbers.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

BOOTLEGGING SAID TO BE ON THE INCREASE

VICTORIA, May 4.—Although the official figures covering the sales of liquor in the government stores for the first three months of the year are not available at the moment, it is understood that the removal of the ban in connection with importation has had a very considerable effect both upon the number of prescriptions issued, and consequently upon the amount of the forbidden liquor, disposed of.

Another effect has been felt, however, if information received by the Prohibition Commission is substantiated. Report has it that in several districts of the province liberal importation has been carried on by bootleggers whose business has expanded to a very considerable extent. Their traffic at the present time, moreover, is not confined to the injurious concoctions of their own manufacture, but includes a "watered" variety of the more palatable liquid from the famous distillers. In an endeavor to curtail this new development Colonel Selater has taken steps to warn the chief magistrate of a number of cities—in which suspects are believed to be prosecuting their illegal calling—in an endeavor to stamp it out before the practice gains a more permanent and widespread hold.
