VANCOUVER LAND DISTRICT—DISTRICT OF COAST, RANGE III.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$4 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Parties in pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptor must occupy claims for 2 1/2 years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1/2 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 1/2 acre cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may receive another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 60 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTOR'S FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining in pre-emption with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of the year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers or pre-emptors recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirectly, and from annulment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

VICTORIA MAN INVENTS NEW PHONOGRAPH

B. R. Seabrook Arranges for the Manufacture of Machine at New York.

Word has just been received at Victoria that arrangements have recently been consummated in New York whereby the manufacture on a large scale of the Seabrook phonograph will commence. This phonograph is the invention of B. R. Seabrook, a well-known ex-Victorian, and son of Roads Seabrook.

The machine is described as being of a new type, revolutionary in character. Experts who recently spent a week at Washington, D. C., searching the records of the patent offices there have stated that the Seabrook invention is the first new and fundamental improvement in talking machines in thirty years.

Number of Patents.

The invention is covered by a number of patents, one of which is upon a non-metallic sounding device; another, a device for delivering the full undertones and overtones of the record, and a third, an amplifying chamber which controls the sound waves. The usual order of things is reversed in many particulars. For instance, the horn of the instrument is not intended to, and does not, amplify the sound, the amplification being obtained through the means of a special sound "chimney" built into the machine. Whereas in the ordinary type the sound becomes louder as one approaches the instrument, in the Seabrook it is quite the reverse. As a matter of fact, the melody can be heard close to the horn without any unpleasant effects, but as one moves away from the instrument the sound volume increases perceptibly. In short, the sound waves are amplified after leaving the horn of the machine, thus upsetting some recognized principles of science.

Use of Records.

An interesting feature is that the speed can be delicately regulated and at the same time the pitch varied so as to be attuned to any musical instrument. The reproduction, particularly of the human voice, is unusually distinct and free from blast or squeaking. The machines use any make of disc records.

Mr. Seabrook has recently arranged with a representative of one of the largest and best known manufacturing firms in the United States to undertake quantity production of the machines, and manufacture will commence at once. The instrument, which, externally, will resemble standard styles and will be made in cabinets of varying qualities and prices, will be marketed under the name "Seabrook."

Concert Instrument.

An extra large grand concert instrument will also be made. This machine will be particularly adapted to work in large concert halls and in parks, and while fully retaining the remarkable tonal purity of the smaller Seabrook machines, will deliver sound waves to a great distance.

Included in the deal that has just been transacted by Mr. Seabrook are a number of other inventions, making use of the sound principles of the Seabrook phonograph, such as megaphones, recording apparatus, earphones, fog horns, speaking canopies, etc., all of which are covered by similar fundamental patents to those embraced in the phonograph.
