TAX CHANGES IN ENGLAND PLANNED

There will be at least five considerable changes in taxation in England: 1. A complete recasting of the Income-tax, giving more relief for the married and imposing heavier penalties for evasion. 2. A higher scale of taxation for motor vehicles, together with the dropping of the petrol tax. 3. An increase of the duty upon imported wines, which have not been taxed so heavily since the war as beer and spirits. 4. Higher postal rates. 5. A solution of the problem of the Excess Profits Tax, which now stands at 40 per cent.

BEE KEEPER COMING

To the Editor:— For some time past I have been receiving your daily paper and will say that it has been read with much interest. I would have called on you before but was injured in a railway accident.

I am coming to your country to engage in the production of honey. I believe that you have a bee-keeper's paradise. I learned of a man who took a few colonies of bees to Smithers and secured something like 200 lbs. per colony. Another man took a few colonies to Telkwa and secured an enormously big crop. Now if these reports are true, this industry can be made a big one.

What I want now is to get hold of someone who can furnish me with a map showing the locations of these places and distance from Prince Rupert and other shipping points. It is possible that your location right around Prince Rupert might be just as good as any of the places mentioned. I can see that you have a good planing mill in your city, which is another important factor, as it requires a lot of finished material in the manufacture of bee-hive and fixtures.

You might know someone who can give me a little information on the bee business there, also weather conditions, range of temperature for instance, as I would like to know just how cold it gets there. Winters here in northern Ohio are very severe. We have had cold weather from December till now, and it is still cold and bad. Bees are half of them dead.

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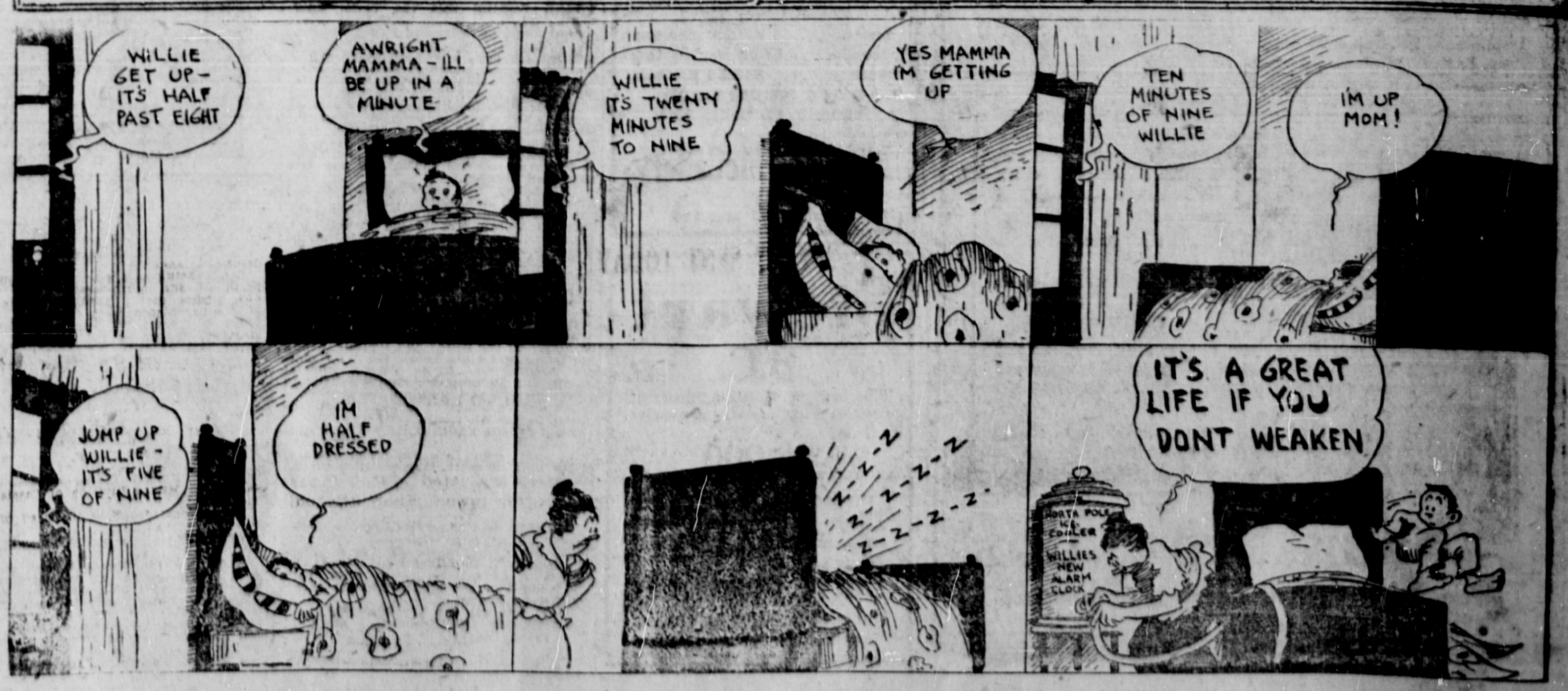
