WASHINGTON, May 5.—Alaska's first big reindeer drive is to take place next summer when a herd of twenty-five hundred will be driven from the Kuskokwim Valley to Broad Pass where they will be close to the federal railroad for shipment of the surplus to the States. The United States Government owns fifteen hundred of these animals and the additional thousand are owned by natives.

Secretary of the Interior Payne says that he sees no good reason why these animals should not be grazed close to the railroad where they will be handy for shipment.

An appropriation of six thousand dollars is to be used in making the drive and maintaining the natives who will be required to look after the herds. The plan contemplates the development of a herd of six hundred thousand reindeer with an annual meat production of one hundred thousand pounds.

IRON SMELTER IS DISCUSSED

Mr. Pattullo Suggests that All Possible Data be Assembled and Placed Before Minister of Mines.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade in their rooms last night there was a somewhat long and acrimonious discussion on the possibility of developing the iron and coal deposits of Copper River district and the establishment of an iron and steel industry. In introducing the matter President Parker suggested that as their able representative, T. D. Pattullo, was present it might be well to take up with him any matters in which they were interested. The northern district had been well taken care of and the Prince Rupert appropriations were quite liberal. There were many matters, however, such as smelters and roads that might be discussed.

Iron Question.

A. C. Garde introduced the iron question. He mentioned that the report of Mr. Galloway had overlooked the coal fields at Copper River when reporting to the Minister of Mines. These were most promising and there was an excellent site for a blast furnace. Everything necessary for the establishment of blast furnaces was present.

Mr. Garde emphasized that the bounty offered by the Provincial Government meant a great thing. It would amount to something like five million dollars in five years as they could not expect a government to do more than that.

A. M. Manson took exception to any reflection on Mr. Galloway, who was an eminent engineer.

J. B. Roerig suggested that all should get behind Mr. Garde who he felt would yet see a steel works established here as a fruition of his work. Mr. Garde had declared that the Salmon River was rich even when everyone was leaving the district. His judgment was proved correct.

Several others took part in the discussion which ended most harmoniously.

Assemble Data.

T. D. Pattullo urged that they should assemble all their data and place it before the Minister of Mines when he visited the district in June.

The matter was left to the mining committee.
