## Strike Situation Is Still Unchanged

### EVOLUTION IN MEXICO SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN COMPLETELY SUCCESSFUL

#### All Northern Steamers Tie Up Except Princess Mary and Prince George

Princess Mary will give Temporary Service but All Other Vessels Await Outcome of Strike; Prince Rupert made run to Victoria and Seattle

VANCOUVER, May 10.—The service between this city and Seattle, Anyox and Stewart was cut off this morning when the steamer Princess Rupert returned from Seattle and Victoria. She arrived from the north on Saturday and her crew then left her tied up at the G. T. P. dock. Captain Nicholson was successful in securing a small crew to take the vessel to Victoria and return, but he has failed to secure a crew for the return run.

It is reported here that the Prince George, now the only G. T. P. steamer operating, will tie up on her return from the north on Monday.

The strike situation is unchanged, all the C. P. R. boats with the exception of the Princess Beatrice and Princess Ena sailing. The G. T. P. and Union Steamship Company's boats are idle.

It is officially announced here that there will be temporary service to Prince Rupert and Skagway by the C. P. R. steamer Princess Mary which left here Saturday for those points.

#### SHOP GIVEN SCARLET GOWN

Official of Anglican Church Honored at Vancouver.

The annual convocation of the Anglican Theological College in Vancouver, B. C., last week in Vancouver, Bishop Du Vernet was presented with a new scarlet gown representing the degree of Doctor of Divinity which he holds, on the part of the board of governors of the college. In making the presentation Bishop de Pencier said that nothing had ever given him greater pleasure. The ecclesiastical sense of fairness which the archbishop had displayed during the eight years of his presidency of the college had won the admiration of all of them.

VANCOUVER, May 10.—The bricklayers' strike here has been settled by arbitration. The bakers are still out. In Victoria they are resuming deliveries to the houses today. In Vancouver they will do the same tomorrow. The output of bread is reported to be almost normal.

#### GOVERNOR IS AT OTTAWA

Arrived from England Yesterday and Was Met by Officials.

He was met by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec, E. R. Beatty, president of the C. P. R., and others.

#### OLIVER CANNOT GET TO RUPERT

No Means of Transportation from Quesnel to Prince George.

Hearing that Premier Oliver was at Quesnel, Hon. T. D. Pattullo last week-end telegraphed him an invitation to come to the city by way of Prince George. A reply has been received as follows:

Under the agreement, Colonel McMordie will be responsible for the entire building so that the matter is out of the hands of the school trustees except for the regularly monthly payments on the architect's certificate.
