NO POSTPONEMENT OF CONFERENCE WITH GERMANS AT SPA

PARIS, May 9.—Reports that the Germans will request a postponement of the meeting of the allied and German representatives at Spa from May 25 to June 10 after the German elections are regarded in French official circles as plausible, in view of the difficulty Germany is having in getting ready for the conference. No request for a postponement has yet been received from the Germans, but it is stated that it will soon come. The Allies are disposed not to grant a delay because of the urgency of holding the meeting and also because the League of Nations financial conference at Brussels cannot be held until after that at Spa.

Sport Briefs

Charley McCarthy, the lightweight champion of Canada, who will defend the title next Wednesday evening in a 12-round contest with Chet Neff, holds more war medals than any other boxer in the world. He is a native Canadian boy, having been born near Ottawa but now making his home in Canada and was not slow to answer the nation's call to arms at the beginning of the war. Even after being discharged from the Princess Pats for wounds sustained in France he joined up with a Minnesota battalion. Among the war awards he holds are the Croix de Guerre with 7 bars, King Albert Belgian Medal, Military Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, and an Italian military award.

Evidently the Yanks at Ketchikan were inclined to give their sailor boxer the best of things in his six-round contest with Chet Neff at the fish town last Friday. Local fans who went up with Neff say that he had the best of the fight with the exception of one round but there were no judges and the referee gave a draw decision. There is little doubt that had Neff extended himself much he would have gained an indisputable decision. Perhaps he's saving up for Wednesday for he will be forced to show all the speed and skill he's got when he enters the squared circle with McCarthy.

Both McCarthy and Neff are working out nightly at the Trail Club, McCarthy with his manager, Frank Smithers, and Neff with Len Halliday. Both are in good condition and are improving daily so that when the night of the fight comes they should be in the best of trim for the encounter. Local opinion seems to give the odds to McCarthy but Neff is coming up and although he has not been fighting the same class of boxers as McCarthy has been lately, there is no doubt that he will put up a good fight. McCarthy is naturally the favorite from sentimental reasons if none other.

On their return from their trip of victory to the Olympic games at Antwerp, the Winnipeg Falcons, champion hockey team of the world, will be tendered a civic banquet and presented with gold watches on May 15 to express Winnipeg's appreciation of the laurels they have won. A parade is to be organized by the Amateur Hockey Association. The Falcons are today nearing Montreal on the Atlantic lap of their overseas trip. At London where they spent a couple of days they were tendered a great reception.

 Horatio Bottomly, editor of John Bull, has made a bitter attack on Lady Astor, raking up her past life and exposing it to the vulgar gaze and charging the lady with inconsistency. Poor old Bottomly has to have someone to berate. He lives on berating other people and yet his own past will not bear inspection. Such is life.

Bottomly is representative of a type that lives on the temporary lapses of better people than himself. He is always looking for the flaws in a person's character and ruthlessly exposes them to the million men and women who enjoy reading of the shortcomings of the successful. If Bottomly were let loose in this town he could make things so uncomfortable that there would not be one man or woman left with an untainted record. If there was no flaw he could find circumstantial evidence that would seem to point to one.

Probably Bottomly is a useful member of society. He has been the means of pricking many a bubble and exposing many a crook. If all the bubbles were pricked, however, there would not be much substance left in this world.

Consistency A Jewel.
 Consistency is a jewel, says one of the great writers. Yes, he is right, but people do not fall in love with jewels nor do jewels influence men and women to action. It is the inconsistencies of women that are their chief charm. If they were always the same and easily understood they would not be liked half as well. Horatio Bottomly knows enough about women to know that the best women are never consistent. For that reason he might have held his wicked pen, instead of attacking a woman like Lady Astor.

Montreal Witness On Paper Shortage.
 What is the cause of this famine, and can it be cured? Inquires the Montreal Witness. There is always a greatly increased hunger for news in war time. If millions of men who might be buyers are away, they multiply the number of buyers at home, and the number of papers each buys. But this is only the beginning of the cause of the increased consumption of paper. During a war, and still more after it, there is always—we need not ask why—a wild increase in buying and selling, with extraordinary and ever-rising prices. These are conditions which encourage extravagant advertising, demanding, in view of the inflated circulation, a fabulous amount of paper. The paper mills were kept running day and night, using up what stock they had—stocks that were abnormally small because so many of the lumbermen were at the front, or, having returned, had had enough of camp life, and refused to leave the cities. Some who went to the woods developed more Bolshevism than brawn, and produced much less logs at much higher wages. So the supply became scarce as the demand multiplied. Paper cost much more to make but increased in selling price much faster than the cost of making. The mills claim that for years they have been working at a loss, by which they perhaps mean that, owing to government restrictions of price, they have been selling much below the prices they would have got. At all events, they think very naturally that the market price is their fair right. Still they have before them the question of the life or death of many of the publications which, while not making money are greatly serving the public, and by which they have themselves in some measure lived in the past. If only for their own sake they have surely too much interest in the continuance and development of their own home market to sacrifice it for the sake of the demand abroad even though tempted by extraordinarily profitable rates of exchange.
