It was arranged at the meeting that for the future meetings should be held every 1st and 3rd Monday of the month at the tea rooms of W. Smeaton, 2nd Ave. All local railway employees are said to be quite enthusiastic about the forwarding of a movement to get the "unorganized" elements of the system working together. They feel that as it has been, there has been lacking a true appreciation of the work of the men and women who daily work between the chiefs and the "organized" trades of the railway. F. W. Grimble was chosen representative to the Trades and Labor Council.

NARROW ESCAPE FOR BEN SELF

Seized With Fainting Spell Coming From Ketchikan and Nearly Fell Overboard.

After a rough passage from Ketchikan, Ben Self, Chet Neff and party, who went north for the fight between Neff and Reuder returned at 6 o'clock yesterday morning. They left Ketchikan at 6 o'clock Saturday morning but, on account of heavy weather, laid at Mary Island light-house from 9 Saturday morning to 8 in the evening. The trip was made on the launch Provincial, Captain A. Swanson. Just before the boat tied up at Mary Island, Ben Self had a narrow escape. Beaming seaskiff, he left the cabin of the boat to get fresh air outside and was seized with a fainting spell on the deck. He became insensible and fell to the deck, rolling to the low curbing, the only barrier between the deck and the sea. He was picked up later in a pool of blood from a cut on his nose. He does not know how long he was lying unconscious.

HEAD-ON COLLISION BETWEEN PASSENGER AND FREIGHT TRAIN

TEXARCANA, May 8.—A head-on collision occurred here today between a Missouri Pacific local passenger train and an extra freight. Officials have said that the passenger train was badly wrecked and four cars of the freight completely demolished. No details as to casualties have yet been received.

LARGE SUMS ARE LOANED SOLDIERS

OTTAWA, May 8.—In a comprehensive review of the soldier settlement, for which Hon. Arthur Meighen is asking \$50,000,000, was given in the House of Commons at the week-end. From the time of incorporation until March 27 last loans aggregating \$58,589,069 had been approved. There had been 50,000 applications under the scheme of which \$36,000 had been approved.

MAY COST TEN CENTS TO REGISTER LETTER

Minister of Customs and Inland Revenue Makes Resolution to This Effect

Ottawa, May 9.—An increase in the maximum registration fee from five to ten cents on letters or other articles sent by registered mail is proposed in a resolution introduced by the Minister of Customs and Inland Revenue.
