Hearst Wins Out In Ship Injunction.

When the United States entered the war against Germany, all German ships in United States ports were seized. After the war was over the United States Shipping Board prepared to sell the ships, but an injunction to restrain them was secured by William Randolph Hearst, the champion of Germany. The injunction has now been made perpetual and it seems as if the U.S. is now unable to deal with the matter.

Just what she will do with the ships does not appear. It they cannot be sold, will they be operated by the nation or returned to the former owners? There seems to be no other alternative.

Japan Joins With States and Britain.

A new treaty has been formed. It is not a formal one but it is bound to have all the effect of a treaty. It is a pact between the United States, Japan and Great Britain in regard to loans to China and is known officially as a "Consortium." It provides that the three countries act in unison in regard to the loans, and is intended to be a restraining influence on Japan. By the arrangement, Japan practically agrees to hold her hand in China, acting only with the other two countries.

Considering the aggressiveness of the little island kingdom across the Pacific, the new arrangement tends to bring Japan in line and make possible a lengthy peace. On the other hand it gives Japan one more reason why she should receive equal treatment for her citizens in all parts of the world. It will have its effect doubtless in British Columbia.


