CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION AT THE CAPITAL

Gathering will be Held This Year to Name Leader and State Policy

TORONTO, May 22.—Complete reorganization of the Conservative party throughout Canada preparatory to a Dominion convention in Ottawa "at the earliest possible date" is the decision of the twenty-six representative Conservatives who met a few days ago in private conference at the Ryrie Building, and later at the Albany Club. In eleven carefully-drawn resolutions, each "carried unanimously," the Conservatives make known the result of their deliberations. Hon. Robert Rogers' political genius assisted, and to some extent guided decisions, and Col. John Currie, M.P., the leader of the "ginger group" at Ottawa was a notable attendant.

The National Policy brought up to date is heralded as the Conservative slogan in the next Federal election. Political tribute is paid to agriculture, to which "no handicaps of any kind must be allowed"; to Labor, whose needs must be met, and to the women, in whose commonsense the Conservatives confess an abiding faith. Another resolution acknowledges the nation's debt to the returned men of Canada.

Will Choose a Leader

No infogation, official or unofficial, was forthcoming from participants in the conference as to the feelings of the stalwarts on the question of leadership. Aside from Hon. Robert Rogers' probable choice, one could not even infer a single delegate's preference. That a leader will be chosen at the Ottawa conference is stated in the resolution. Sir Robert's return, declared Hon. Mr. Rogers early in the proceedings, had nothing to do with the calling of the conference, which, he stated had been arranged for long ago. But unless Sir Robert's absence has made the hearts of Mr. Rogers and Col. Currie grow immeasurably fonder, there will be no suspicion that it is a Borden convention for which they are making arrangements.

Among the resolutions which the conference carried are the following:—

A Dominion Convention.

"That when active organization of the Conservative party through out Canada has progressed satisfactorily, a Dominion Convention of the Conservatives be held in the city of Ottawa at the earliest possible date during the present year, for the purpose of selecting a leader and dealing with such other matters as may properly come before the convention."

Back to the National Policy.

"That Canada's hope to national greatness invites today more than ever before a continuation of that traditional national policy, brought up to date as Maedonald and Cartier would bring it were they here to see the wonderful opportunities which the return of peace presents to rebuild a greater and stronger, a more united, prosperous Canada as the largest and the leading Dominion in the great Commonwealth of the British Empire."

Reorganize Everywhere.

"That we fulfill our plain duty to our country by taking immediate steps to reorganize the Conservative party in all the provinces. With such organization we can feel assured that, through united force and action, and the help of commonsense, the Conservative party will not only intelligently grapple with the present apprehension and discontent that is to be found everywhere, but will deal—and deal in a definite and permanent way—for the common good of all, for the common good of Canada, with our fiscal, our soldier, our labor, our fisheries, our agriculture, and other domestic problems that so insistently cry today for attention and solution."

J. E. Merryfield of Vancouver was the only British Columbia delegate.
