The table given is for Port
 Simpson but the time for Prince
 Rupert varies only a few minutes
 on some days and on others is
 the same. The range of the tide
 may be computed as 5 per cent
 greater at Prince Rupert than at
 Port Simpson both at springs and
 neaps. Therefore the rise in the
 Prince Rupert harbor is slightly
 greater than Port Simpson.

DYBHAVN TO REPRESENT CITY

Alderman is Member of Canadian
 Fisheries Association and
 Speak for Rupert.

On motion of Alderman Perry,
 seconded by Alderman Murray,
 Alderman Dybhavn is to go to the
 Fisheries Convention in Vancou-
 ver early in June as a representa-
 tive of this city. Alderman
 Dybhavn, in speaking to the mo-
 tion, stated that circumstances
 over which he had no control
 might prevent him from going,
 but still he hoped to get away. He
 also stated that as representative
 of the council he could not be ad-
 mitted to the convention, but his
 membership to the Canadian Fish-
 eries Association would give him
 this right.

The council members were
 unanimous in the selection and
 all thought that the city should
 be represented and that the new
 fisheries regulations be strongly
 supported against any attempt to
 have them rescinded by southern
 interests. The consideration of
 these regulations will form an
 important part of the convention
 program.

PUBLICITY FOR FAIR

Arrangements for Grants Made
 at Meeting Last Night.

At the meeting of the Agri-

 was decided to give a grant to
 various publications in the city
 to aid in the advertising of this
 year's exhibition. The Empire
 has been granted \$150, the News

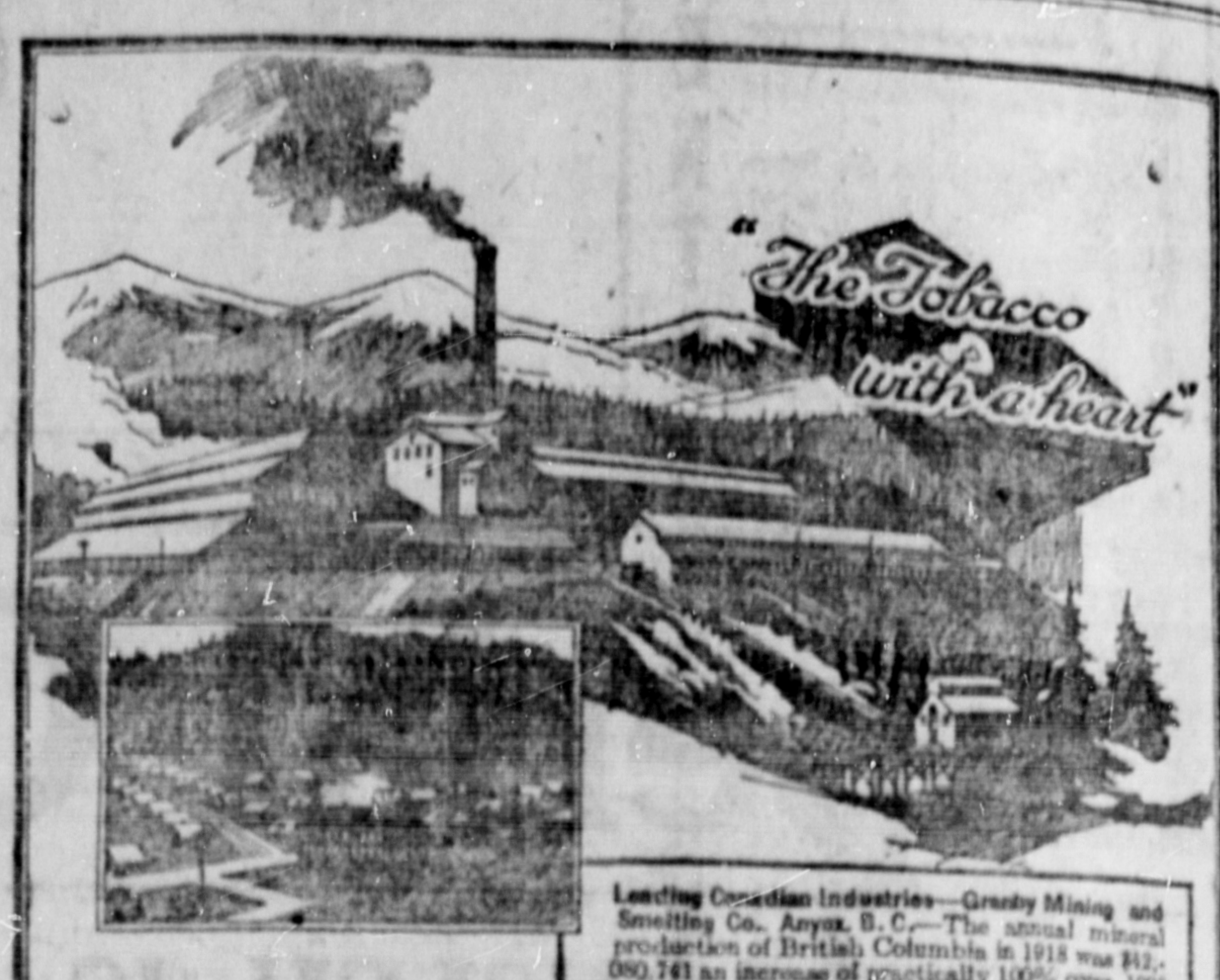
