### EXPLORATION TRIP TO NORTHERN WATERS

Yacht Tramontana Purchased by  
Old Sealers for Expedition

Men who were associated with the Sea Wolf that Jack London made famous and the old schooner Casco that once belonged to Robert Louis Stevenson—salts who are known well along the local waterfront, where they have been familiar figures in the past—will set out in a few days on an exploration trip to Northern waters. Captain H. Blackstad, one time master of the Bayard, and well known through his sealing activities in the past, will command the yacht Tramontana, which has been purchased for the expedition. Captain Charlie Le Blanc and Jack McConville are also associated in the venture, says the Victoria Colonist.

Captain LeBlanc was another well known sealer out of Victoria for twenty years, and at one time skippered the Casco. He also sailed with the Sea Wolf.

Jack McConville was cook on the Sauey Lass and other sealers out of Victoria in the old days, and has been interested in mining in later years. He ran a store on Texada Island.

Joe Coyle, who will act as engineer on the boat, is apparently not known here.

The Tramontana has been provisioned for a trip of not less than five months, and has on board plenty of ammunition and fishing tackle to assist in the augmentation of the larder. The party will prospect in the North, and later a similar trip will be made to the South Seas if present plans hold good.

The Tramontana is an auxiliary yacht with beautiful lines, and finished in mahogany throughout. Seventy-five feet over all and with an eighteen-foot beam, she carries a twenty-five horsepower Frisco Standard engine capable of driving the boat at seven knots. Captain Blackstad expects to get ten knots out of her under sail.

Built fourteen years ago for the Pacific Ocean yacht race, the Tramontana came off the stocks just too late to take part in the contest. Since that time she has had a number of different owners. In addition to the men above named the yacht carries a crew of four men.

### 50,000 BOTTLES OF WHISKEY IN CACHE

Stuff Said to be Valued at Half  
Million Dollars.

DETROIT, May 24.—Information leading to knowledge of the whereabouts of 50,000 quarts of whiskey and other liquors hidden along the Detroit River between Detroit and Trenton is said to have been gained by Federal prohibition agents.

Such a quantity of liquor, at present prices, would be worth at least half a million dollars.

Conducting a secret investigation today, agents of the Government questioned men believed to have knowledge of the whiskey-smuggling industry, forcing them to tell where the liquor was cached. Buried in the ground, planted in old barns and boat-houses, and even hidden in the riverbed, the stuff will be permitted to remain where it is while the Federal agents make a round-up.

### CURRIE INVITED

Famous General Asked to Give  
Address to Industrial  
Congress.

EDMONTON, May 25.—Efforts are being made to have Lieut.-General Sir Arthur Currie, leader of the Canadians in France and Flanders, give an address to the Industrial Congress at its evening session to be held in Edmonton, June 4th next. Sir Arthur has not visited this part of the west since his return from overseas last year and the congress management will use all its power to bring the celebrated military leader to Edmonton to attend congressional sessions to be held in the Edmonton Memorial hall.

KELSON, Wn., May 25.—Two children were burned to death and two young women sustained burns and the mother was badly hurt when the residence in the Henry Block was destroyed early Sunday.

### LOCATED BOAT

Provincial Police Carried Urgent  
Message to Owner of  
"Dipehuk"

Feeling very grateful to Chief Minty and the Provincial Police Department, A. A. Walters, of the fishing boat "Dipehuk," arrived in town Monday in time to sail south on the Prince George. On Saturday afternoon a telegram was received from Victoria addressed to A. A. Walters, gasboat "Dipehuk," Prince Rupert, saying "Come. Mother dying." Although extensive inquiries were made, the name was unknown until Captain Erceman of the Narbethong was seen and he remembered seeing a boat at Dundas Island.

Chief Minty immediately despatched the police boat to Dundas Island on the chance of locating the boat, which was successfully done and Mr Walters was brought to town in time to catch the G.T.P. steamer for his home.

### NOT FOR POOR MAN


D. D. McKenzie Criticizes Budget  
in Dominion House of  
Commons

Criticizing the budget in the Commons D. D. McKenzie is reported to have said:

The budget had brought no relief to anyone. The poor man was taxed as much as the rich. The millionaires had gone to the minister and said "Why should those gentiles of the lower and middle classes be permitted to be clothed in purple and fine linen, which by divine right belongs to us, our wives and our children."

The idea of this government doing anything for the poor people or to reduce the high cost of living was absurd. Sworn evidence, given by Sir Thomas White, before a special commission on the cost of living showed that a total of \$276,000,000 had been extracted from the pockets of the Canadian people to purchase Canadian produce for the relief of European countries during the war. The cost of living had been thereby increased and Mr McKenzie drew attention to the fact that this vast sum, constituting loans to other countries, was not even mentioned in the statement of assets read on Tuesday by the minister of finance. The government's friends, the rich men of the country, had been virtually allowed to spend this sum as they pleased, and to exploit Canadian produce to maintain high prices in Canada.
