"Parliament has confessed its inability to redeem former pledges and restore to the returned soldier dependents in a substantial measure those economic advantages they would now enjoy but for war service."



Seaplane to be Taken In on June 4 to Survey Lands Difficult of Access from Coast, Expect Work to Take Four Days

VANCOUVER, May 28 .- Aircraft Construction Co. representatives here are arranging to ship on June 4 a seaplane from Vancouver to Bella Coola under arrangement with J. H. Brownlee, land surveyor and Wyoming cattleman, who wants to inspect a tract of meadowland four miles south of Anaham Lake, one hundred miles east of Bella Coola.
