Develop Canada's Mineral Resources.

In connection with the big steel merger, mention of which has been made on several occasions in this paper, the London Times in a recent issue just to hand says:—

"It marks a great step forward in the commercial development of the Empire and provides fresh testimony to the enterprise which the leaders of British industry are displaying at a moment when the ability of British manufacturers to regain the ground lost in the war is being put to the test. The scheme means much to both Canada and to Britain, and its importance in ensuring future supplies of iron ore for the steel plants of this country can hardly be over-estimated.

"By general agreement Canada has reached a point when the active development of her mineral resources would in any case have been taken in hand. But her financial resources and her experience in the steel industry rendered it inevitable that she should look outside her own borders for the assistance necessary for such development, and had no other interests come forward with an offer such as the British group has made, there can be little doubt that the task would ultimately have developed upon the iron and steel interests of the United States.

"As an outcome of this consolidation these vast resources will be preserved for the benefit of the British Empire, and another link will have been forged in the commercial chains which are steadily rendering Britain and the overseas Dominions more and more interdependent."

Minister Should Be in Commons.

In the House of Commons recently Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader, objected to the ministers of labor and soldiers reconstruction being members of the Senate where they were unable to answer questions asked by members. He said that these were the two important portfolios at the present time and the ministers in charge should be members of the House of Commons.

Mr. King might have gone further and suggested that an appointed Senate at this stage of the world's history was an anomaly that should be at once removed. To have an old men's home in which to put politicians who were of no further use or whom the people had rejected, was not in line with modern methods of government.

It is often argued that the Senate has been useful. So is an absolute monarch, but that is no reason for our returning to the absolute monarchical type of Government. The best kind of government often is the paternal government, but no development lies that way. So no development lies in the way of the continuation of the Canadian Senate in its present form.

Up to Government to Solve Car Problem.

Now that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is a Government road it is up to the Government to solve the local car situation. We hope that Colonel Peck will not allow the minister of labor or any other minister at Ottawa to camouflage him into believing that it is not possible to secure cars to handle fish shipped from this port. If the present penalty for retaining cars is not heavy enough it is for the Government to increase it. The United States roads will not retain the cars unless it pays to do so.

It has been evident for a long time past that there is a nigger hidden away somewhere in the forest of useless sticks—Ottawa. Is it that the Government does not care about the interests of this city? Would they like to kill the trade of this port? If they are in earnest in the matter we hope to see results. We believe Colonel Peck is sincere in trying to serve the people here, but it is no good to say this problem cannot be solved. It must be solved or we must know the reason why, and it must be a better reason than that the United States won't play fair.

Just now there seems to be an improvement in the situation. Possibly this is the beginning of a better condition, but if it is not, we must get together and give Ottawa another jolt. Now that it is announced that the election is two or three years away we cannot be accused of playing politics in asking that action be taken in regard to this matter at once.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

It has been announced in Montreal that Joe Stelcher and Wladek Zybyszko have both accepted the offer of a \$10,000 purse made by the Canadian Hockey Club. This world's championship bout will take place in Montreal in the near future.

Benny Leonard Signed.

Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, has signed an agreement to defend his title against Charlie White, of Chicago, in a ten-round contest at Benton Harbor, Michigan, on July 5. Leonard will receive a guarantee of \$45,000. The weight will be 135 pounds at 10 o'clock. The match will be staged in the open and an arena will be built to accommodate between 20,000 and 30,000 persons.
