

Strikers Accept Companies' Terms and Return to Work

Are given Advance of Ten Dollars a Month and right of having Union Representatives present during **Future Negotiations**

VANCOUVER, May 29.—The strike is over. The strikers FOREST FIRES almost unanimously accepted the terms offered by the company and go back to work. All boats that have been tied up or delayed will get away on schedule immediately.

The basis of settlement of the strike is an advance of \$10 a month all round to the men and recognition by the companies of the union men in their own crews. An arrangement is made with he men as a concession to the union, that in future negotiations adjust difficulties union representatives shall be present.
