**Sport Briefs**

**Carpentier vs. Levinsky**

Announcement was made in New York at the first of the week by Jack Curley, manager of Georges Carpentier, that the European champion has signed articles to box Batting Levinsky not later than July 26. The bout will be twelve or fifteen rounds, with or without a decision, in New York City or New Jersey, according to Curley, who will promote the scrap. The men will weigh 175 pounds at the ringside. "If Carpentier loses he will go back to France," said Curley. "He wants to disprove the American insinuations that he is afraid of American boxers. He will try to sign up for a fight with Dempsey as soon as the American champion gets clear of his draft evasion troubles."

**Hoisted Pennant**

Last Saturday afternoon, before the opening of a four game series with the Boston Braves, the world's baseball championship pennant, won by them last fall from the Chicago White Sox, was hoisted at Redland Field, home of the Cincinnati Reds. The Reds are forging ahead in the National League this year and may possibly repeat. They are second in the race, with Pittsburg in the lead, but not so very far ahead.

**Resolute Mast Snaps**

The hollow wooden mast of the Resolute cumbered up at New-haven, Connecticut, last week, as the boat was finishing the first round of her first tuning up race with Vanitie. With a crash mast, spars, sails and rigging went over the starboard bow. Vanitie which was about two minutes astern came up in the wind and after ascertaining that no one was injured, bore up for the harbor. After the accident the yacht was towed to Bristol, R.I., where a spare steel mast will be put on for a resumption of the races with Vanitie to decide which shall defend America's Cup against Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock IV. These will begin early next week off Newport and the Resolute is now undergoing repairs at Bristol. All hands on the boat seem to feel that the accident came at an opportune time, and that no re-

**Government Support**

Official government recognition of the British Olympic Committee's effort to secure a representative team to compete in the Olympic games at Antwerp this summer; has been made by the appointment of a committee of the British House of Commons of which the Speaker is the president, to assist in the work. This action is expected to lighten considerably the financial task of securing funds to provide for troops at Antwerp. It will also add impetus for the movement for a strong, creditable team, which, owing to the slow collection of contributions, recently led to the expression of opinion that Great Britain's team would not be up to former standards. Under the new conditions it is expected that the British team for the main events will number at least 250 athletes.
