THAT it is said Prince Rupert is one of the healthiest spots in British Columbia.



Sport Briefs

Carpentier vs. Levinsky

Announcement was made in New York at the first of the week by Jack Curley, manager of Georges Carpentier, that the European champion has signed articles to box Battling Levinsky not later than July 26. The bout will be twelve or fifteen rounds, with or without a decision, in New York City or New Jersey, according to Curley, who will promote the scrap. The men will weigh 175 pounds at the ringside, "If Carpentier loses he will go back to France," said Curley. "He wants to disprove the American insinuations that he is afraid of American boxers. He will try to sign up for a fight with Dempsey as soon as the American champion gets clear of his draft evasion troubles."

Hoisted Pennant

Last Saturday afternoon, before the opening of a four game series with the Boston Braves, the world's baseball championship pennant, won by them last fall from the Chicago White Sox, was hoisted at Redfield Field, home of the Cincinnati Reds. The Reds are forging ahead in the National League this year and may possibly repeat. They are second in the race, with Pittsburgh in the lead, but not so far ahead.

Resolute Mast Snaps

The hollow wooden mast of the Resolute climbed up at Newhaven, Connecticut, last week, as the boat was finishing the first round of her first tuning up race with Vanitie. With a crash mast, spars, sails and rigging went over the starboard bow. Vanitie which was about two minutes astern came up in the wind and after ascertaining that no one was injured, bore up for the harbor. After the accident the yacht was towed to Bristol, R.I., where a spare steel mast will be put on for a resumption of the races with Vanitie to decide which shall defend America's Cup against Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock IV. These will begin early next week off Newport and the Resolute is now undergoing repairs at Bristol. All hands on the boat seem to feel that the accident came at an opportune time and that no re-

NEW SUPERINTENDENT G.T.P. TELEGRAPHS

A circular has just been issued from headquarters of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, Winnipeg, announcing the appointment of R. M. McMillan to the position of Division Superintendent of the Grand Trunk Pacific Telegraph Company, with headquarters at Winnipeg, succeeding F. T. Caldwell, who recently resigned the office to accept a position with the Automatic Electric Co. of Chicago.

Mr. MacMillan occupied the position of traffic supervisor of the G.T.P. Telegraph Company previous to this appointment and often visited Prince Rupert. He is succeeded by J. A. C. Kelman who for a number of years has been chief operator and circuit manager with headquarters at the Union Station, Winnipeg.

Signed tenders will be received by the Minister of Lands not later than noon on the 1st day of June, 1920, for the purchase of Licence X 2385, to cut 1,000,000 feet of Spruce, Hemlock and Cedar and 13,000 linear feet of Piling on an area situated on Cummins Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands District.

One (1) year will be allowed for removal of timber.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in accordance with an Amendment to the "Townsite Proportionate Allotment Act" passed at the last session of the Legislature any person holding an agreement for sale from the Minister of Lands regarding the alienation of Town or City lots or lands within the site or suburb of a town payment for which has not been made in full and who wishes to obtain a proportionate allotment of land in the townsite, may apply on the monies already paid to the Minister in that respect on or before the 1st day of September, 1920, on which date the privilege of obtaining a proportionate allotment of land in the townsite will be denied unless payment is made in full.
