Speeding Up at

Shipyard. There is to be a speeding up at the shipyard. It is understood that two shifts a day will-be worked in order to get the vessels off the stocks within a reasonable time. Derricks have already been erected and the work will go ahead in a businesslike manner.

Recently the Victoria shipyards, backed by the returned soldiers of that city, made overtures to the Dominio nGovernment for further contracts for the yards there. The Government refused the request, saying they had no money. That seems to be an indication that nothing can be expected from the Government here. It is to be hoped, however, that contracts will be secured from private firms and that the yards will continue to operate.

Ship Strike Is Settled.

None of the dispatches are very clear in regard to the settlement of the ship strike. That it is settled, however, is clear and that to most people is the important thing. Now it is possible that business will pick up and continue good throughout the summer. Happily the city was only just beginning to suffer as a result of the trouble. From this on there should be an improvement.


