

### PRINCE RUPERT LIQUOR SALES

Little Variation for First Four Months of Year—Vancouver Dropped Off.

VICTORIA, May 31.—The official returns of liquor sales in Prince Rupert were for January, \$3,670; February, \$3,547; March, \$3,505, and for April \$3,729. The sales at Quesnel were for March, \$165, and April, \$40. Vancouver store sales for December exceeded a quarter of a million dollars, while in April it had dropped to \$92,846. The sales at the Victoria store showed \$60,000 in December and \$22,467 in April while, from April to January the total amount disposed of at the Government store was \$638,542.84, the number of prescriptions during the same time being 92,417. In Prince Rupert and Quesnel the sales were made to druggists by the respective government agents.

### JURY CRITICIZES JAIL AT TORONTO

TORONTO, May 31.—We are of the opinion that the present structure has long outlived its usefulness. This building is a disgrace to the country and citizens do not realize the conditions existing there. A modern building should be erected to meet present-day requirements.

Such is the report contained in the presentation of the Grand Jury delivered at the opening of the Assizes as to the state of affairs existing at the Toronto Jail. It refers to the fact that other Grand Juries have harped on the same conditions, and mentions that those in authority have as yet seen fit to disregard all such reports.

There were 89 men and 10 women in the institution when it was visited by the Grand Jurors. Their presentation states that the building is not a fit place in which to keep men and women who are awaiting trial. It refers especially to the insanitary conditions existing there.

### SOLDIER PROSPECTORS MUST SIGN AGREEMENT

Full Particulars in Regard to Scheme may be Secured from George Clothier

Further information has been received by the district mining engineer in regard to the grubstaking of returned soldier prospectors by the Provincial Government. Each man must sign an agreement with the Minister of Mines that he will fulfil the conditions prescribed, including the sharing of all claims with his partner in the field.

The Government agrees to provide a miner's certificate, pack sack, blankets, tent and such other tools and equipment and food as may be necessary; also to provide transportation to a point nearest the prospecting field allotted them; and at the end of the season to pay the leader \$125 and the second man \$100.

People living in Prince Rupert should apply to George Clothier, District Mining Engineer. Action should be taken at once in order that the local party may be sent out as soon as possible.
