## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption new confined to our-

veyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished but parties of not more than four may with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clear-ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than & years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, begranted intermediate certificate of im provement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent resi-

dence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 2 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling realdential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be Mill, factory or industrial sites of timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage. 
