FISHERMEN AT BELLA COOLA HOLD MEETING
 Hear Address Explaining Regulations and Pass Resolution of Confidence in Inspector.

BELLA COOLA, June 2.—At the request of the Fishermen's Union of Bella Coola, a public meeting was held at the town hall on the 26th of May, at which J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries, was present and gave an explanatory address dealing with the new fishery regulations and the open fishing policy recently adopted by the Dominion Fisheries Department. The inspector also explained how the weekly close seasons would be affected by the number of salmon gill-net licenses issued, also the close season for seines; he outlined the proposed methods for conservation, the removal of obstructions in streams, and touched on other interesting subjects. The meeting was largely attended by returned soldier fishermen, returned soldiers, white fishermen, the Indian agent, cannery men and others interested in the fisheries of Bella Coola. At the close of the meeting the following resolution was submitted by A. Christianson and carried unanimously:

The Resolution.
 "That this meeting, representing returned soldier fishermen, white fishermen, Indians, cannery men, and settlers interested in the fisheries of Bella Coola, record their thanks to the inspector for his address on the salmon fisheries tributary to this district and we also express our entire approval and appreciation of his administration of the fisheries in the past, and have every confidence that the salmon fisheries of this district will be conserved and protected, and judiciously administered, so long as he remains inspector of fisheries."

Mr. J. Jorgensen of Bella Coola ably presided over the meeting.

Linking up with Drydock Power.
 It looks like a good proposition for the city to link up with the power plant of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. It should be a good thing for the city and the company. It will insure the city a constant supply of power to tide them over until they can get a hydro-electric plant going or arrange with a private company for a supply. It will also insure the company a sale for their surplus product. While we do not know much about electric plants or the supply of power, the general scheme on the face of it looks good.

Supply of Cars For Fish Business.
 It was good news which arrived yesterday to the effect that thirty new cars were to be built at once for the fish business here. It began to look as if the Government was deliberately trying to starve us out at this point, but possibly it was a lack of realization of the importance of supplying this port with the essentials of life. The fish business is vital to the life of Prince Rupert, but it has been badly checked by failure to supply proper transportation. Thirty cars will be a good commencement toward putting the rolling stock in shape for handling the traffic, but it will not fill the need as the business grows.

Colonel Peck is endeavoring to arouse interest in the fisheries among the people in the east. That is all right, but nothing will arouse the proper interest to such an extent as providing the needed cars and other equipment to handle the business efficiently.

Provincial Government Aid to Fishing.
 A despatch from Vancouver yesterday intimated that the Provincial Government, through the Industrial Advisory Council, was prepared to lend aid to returned soldier fishermen if the Dominion Government failed to do so. That is good news. There has been a general feeling that the Dominion in trying to put soldiers on the land and taking no interest in the possibilities of fishing were not doing the right thing. There was no objection to settling the land. That was good. What was needed was a corresponding interest in the fishing industry.

Possibly the commission at Ottawa, which is investigating the general question of reconstruction, and of which Colonel Peck is a member, may make some recommendation which will have weight with the Dominion Government and as a result something may yet be done. At any rate it seems to be a matter rather for the Dominion than the province in view of the fact that the fisheries are controlled by the Dominion, and that the Federal Government has taken a great interest in settling returned men on the land.

Japan Ready to Continue Treaty.
 A question that is being discussed in official circles and which will also be discussed by the people at large is whether the treaty between Great Britain and Japan should be renewed. There are many who object to the treaty because it tends to give the Japanese a standing which they might not otherwise possess, and especially in view of the objection often expressed against Oriental fishermen on this coast. The objection is largely economic. It is a matter of work and wages. The farmers have generally asked for Oriental labor, whereas the workmen of the province have been dead against it. In looking at a question of this kind we have to get away from the local aspect. We have to view it in its broadest light and consider its effect on world progress and particularly as it affects the British Empire.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

B. C. PACKERS PAID 6 PER-CENT DIVIDEND
 Officers for Present Year Include Well Known Names.

According to its annual report the British Columbia Packers Association owns 24 salmon canneries, one cold storage plant, a mild-curing establishment and a sawmill in British Columbia, and the stock of the George & Barker Salmon Packing Company at Point Roberts, Wash. Dividends to the amount of \$234,881 were paid last year to the shareholders, and on August 24 the dividend was raised from 5 to 6 per cent. The report also showed that the association had a considerable supply of the lower grades of salmon on hand.

Mr. Barker, who has been occupying the positions of both president and general manager, has resigned the latter, and J. M. Whitehead is the new general manager.
