**SEMI-DEISEL ENGINE  
FOR MARINE BOAT**

To Be Built at Victoria for Rupert  
Agency by Returned Soldiers

The boat which is to be built at  
the Point Hope yards at Victoria  
for the marine department here  
is to be equipped with oil engine of  
the semi-deisel type.  
The craft will have certain  
features necessary for the work  
which they must undertake.  
Hoisting gear capable of handling  
heavy buoys, and a clear deck  
space upon which to carry these  
buoys are two points to which at-  
tention is paid.  
The B. C. Yacht and Boat Build-  
ers incorporated some time ago,  
and consists of men who have  
taken the S. C. R. boatbuilding  
course and are now ready to put  
their latest education in practical  
use. They received a loan from  
the Provincial Government to  
start them in business, and they  
have also procured a site for their  
plant on the old reserve north of  
the railway bridge.

The work of building the two  
Government boats was tendered  
on by various British Columbia  
firms. The plans were prepared  
by the Cholberg Shipyard after  
sample plans had been sent to  
Ottawa by a number of different  
concerns.

**PLEBISCITE  
ON LIQUOR  
IN ALBERTA**

Vote on Inter-Provincial Trade to  
Take Place in October.

EDMONTON, June 2.—From in-  
formation brought back by Pre-  
mier Stewart the trans-Canada  
plebiscite on inter-provincial  
shipments of liquor will be held  
about October 25th. In this con-  
ference with the Ottawa authori-  
ties the premier ascertained that  
this date was suggested as the  
most satisfactory to the federal  
government since various ele-  
ments enter into the question  
and make it next to impossible  
for an earlier vote to be arranged.  
Some of the other provinces  
have already signified their will-  
ingness to have the plebiscite the  
last of October and the 25th has  
been practically decided upon as  
the date. Therefore, the ballot-  
ing in Alberta will doubtless be  
on this date. It will be recalled  
that this province was almost the  
first to formally petition by unani-  
mous consent of the legislature  
to have the inter-provincial ship-  
ment of liquor decided by the  
federally authorized plebiscite,  
and it was at one time thought  
the vote would be held about the  
last of June.

It appears, however, that the  
new national election act will be  
placed in action for this plebiscite,  
and the bill will not be dis-  
posed of in parliament for some  
time yet. This is said to be one  
of the principal reasons why the  
provincial voting cannot take  
place until October.

**Big League Stuff.**  
A series of six defeats has  
hauled the Braves down from first  
place in the American League to  
playing second to Cleveland, who  
hasn't been a serious contender  
for years. Now Cleveland has a  
nice start of 8 games in the  
American race and ought to keep  
things interesting for a time any-  
way. Chicago, Brooklyn and Cin-  
cinnati are see-sawing away at  
first place in the National and  
each day sees a change. Pitts-  
burg is standing off about 4 games  
behind but all the rest are under  
the fifty-fifty mark. Probably  
Seattle in the Pacific International  
has made the worst showing in  
any league this year in losing 22  
games and winning only 2.

esting to old and young.


