Husband Was Drunk at Inquest on Death of Wife

Revolting Conduct of man during the Inquiry caused Order for his Arrest; Developments are Expected

VANCOUVER, June 5 .--- G. R. Gross, the husband of Madame Melita Allen, who died as a result of gas poisoning, was arrested by order of the coroner for being drunk and disorderly at the inquest.

The evidence given by J. J. Hutton at the inquest was to the effect that deceased often said she wished her husband dead.

The husband admitted that he was drunk when called to the death chamber of his wife.

It is thought here that startling developments in connection with the case are possible.

The verdict brought in by the jury was "death by gas suffocation at the hands of some person or persons unknown."

The coroner then ordered the continued detention of the husband pending investigation.
