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



VANCOUVER, June 7 .- Two hundred delegates from all over Canada have arrived here to attend the convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association which opened here today. The conrention will discuss big industrial and financial topics and will . unsider the Canadian budget which has just been passed by the louse of Commons. The session will last for three days. T. P. Howard, of Montreal, presides. Mayor Gale opened the conven-
