Tax Payments In the City.

The decision of the city to insist on the payment of taxes this month in order to secure the rebate, is causing a good deal ? of worry to some tax payers who object to being mulcted with ten per cent additional when a month or two later they would be able to care for the payments without difficulty.

Not only are the general taxes payable on or before the end of June, but the local improvement assessments have to be paid | TENTS, SAILS, AWNINGS. by the same date. As it is only about eight months since the last taxes were paid, it seems rather like crowding the men who keep the city going financially, to insist that everything be paid up by the end of June or a ten per cent penalty be added. If it is necessary to make the payments come earlier, it should be done gradually, in order that those who pay may be in a position to make arrangements. The present plan is all the more difficult in view of the fact that the banks are not advancing money for clients who would increase their overdrafts.

Close Season For Halibut.

It seems as if it would be necessary to have a close season for halibut fishing. In the late autumn and early winter the fish are schooling and are easily caught if the weather is good. Then is the time they are about to spawn and fish caught at that time on the banks means that the banks are being robbed, and future seasons made unproductive.' Skeena Only River for Canadians.

The Skeena River is the only large Canadian river on this coast that does not contribute a large part of its salmon to the traps on the American side. The waters of the Fraser, which once teemed with fish, have been almost wholly denuded and that mostly by the fish traps of Washington State. The same. process is now going on at the Naas. Very soon there will be no fish in that river, if the present system is continued.

The American experts talk glibly of the desirability of conservation, but when it comes to making an attempt to do anything definite, the big interests on the other side step in and holding an agreement for sale from treaties or conventions are annulled by the action of Congress.


