KELOWNA, June 7.—A convention of farmers' institutes and the United Farmers organizations, after three hours' discussion, passed a resolution which makes the formation of the one big union of B. C. farmers feasible. Each member pledges his influence in the local organizations to make the amalgamation a success. This is the first step toward the formation of a united farmers' organization in British Columbia.

SCARCITY OF MILK COWS IN PROVINCE. Estimated Shortage of 100,000 Given at Dairymen's Convention. KELOWNA, June 7.—The B. C. Dairymen's convention just closed decided to buy abroad a number of cows for sale in this province. There is a shortage in British Columbia. It is estimated of 100,000 milkers. The farmers of the north are unable to buy any.

At the meeting of the Football Association in the city hall last night, various disturbing points were settled and S. D. Macdonald was again chosen for the presidency in a contest with E. A. Shockley, who had resigned, was re-elected secretary. The suspensions of Harry Bennett, for signing with two teams, and Albert Craggs, for altercation with a referee, are now lifted and all players have a clean sheet. Harry Bennett has signed with the G.T.P. for the remainder of the season.
