LUXURY TAX FULLY EXPLAINED TODAY

Instructions Respecting Reports and Collections.

In this issue of the "News" appears an official advertisement dealing with the Sales and Luxury Taxation Resolutions now in force throughout the Dominion. As the matter is one which affects practically all lines of merchandising and manufacturing, all merchants and manufacturers would do well to clip this advertisement and file it for reference. The subject matter is a verbatim copy of the Memorandum to the Resolutions as forwarded to Collectors of Inland Revenue and is as exact and authoritative a statement on the matter as is available.

Appended to the official memorandum has been outlined in brief form paragraphs dealing with the practical application of the taxation resolutions and the duties of merchants and manufacturers in connection with the matter in so far as reports and collections are to be made under the resolutions.

In the Letter Box

To the Editor.—Dear Sir—Almost everyone on this coast has a desire to own a motor boat of his own. Our peculiar position, with our inland waterways, dotted with beautiful islands, and the fact that every farm, logging camp, mining camp or village is isolated from every other except by water, lends itself to the very natural desire. And our obsolete laws have also been a cause of fostering this same desire.

Now let us consider it from a business point of view. The average man does not use a boat more than one day in a month. Take a launch that will cost \$5,000, and the interest will amount to \$400 per annum at 8 per cent. The insurance will amount to \$400 more and the cost of upkeep will average \$1,825 more, making a total cost of \$2,625, without the cost of operation. The same ratio applies to a larger or smaller launch.

It is much cheaper for you to hire a launch at the prevailing rates. You do not have to pay the cost of upkeep alone, for the reason that many other people are dividing up that cost with you. The launches for hire are generally in much better condition than you can afford to keep one of your own in. When you are through with your hired boat your costs stop. The "Narbethong" is at your service for the sum of 60c per mile; \$4.00 per hour; \$35 per day for cruising work and \$5.00 per hour for towing, with a minimum charge of \$5.00.

So far the resources of the surrounding district have merely been tapped. Farming is in its infancy. In common with the general influx of new settlers to Central British Columbia, Prince George district is getting a full share. Cattle are coming in and the place generally may be said to be settling up.

Lumbering Active. Lumbering will be for some time the most important industry. All along the main line of the G.T.P. new mills are operating, induced there by the high prices of lumber. Following a dispute over working conditions, the men are now again at work.

One of the most up-to-date mills is that at Giscombe. Other mills between there and Prince George are doing well and the men all come to Prince George to spend their money. The lumber output is large, but it is also anticipated that in the near future a pulp plant will be erected in the locality, and there is now both transportation facilities and power.

Although mining is not carried on to any great extent, a number of prospects look promising.

Game. For the sportsman Prince George offers many attractions. Many excellent hotels furnish first-class accommodation. Lakes abound and there are good trout streams not far distant from the city. Fur-bearing animals of many varieties can be caught and the fur business of the centre is very important.

South Fort George and Central Fort George are dwindling in importance and residents are moving into the city. All the people seem to be getting together for a mutual boost for the town.

Mrs. C. F. Robinson, accompanied by her daughter, Gladys, leaves for her home in New Westminster by the Prince Rupert tonight after spending a few days visiting in the city with Mrs. Geo. Munro. Mrs. Robinson was one of the pioneer residents of this city, her husband having been a partner of Mr. Munro's in the contracting business.
