### ALBERTA CROPS LOOKING WELL

Wheat Up and Growing Fast; Still Seeding Barley.

EDMONTON, June 14.—In spite of the cool weather that prevailed during the last two or three weeks the crops in Edmonton district have made rapid growth and the outlook for a bumper crop this year is brighter than ever. In the Rabbit Hills district all of the wheat and oats is seeded, as well as part of the barley. All of the wheat in this district is up as is the case with most of the oats. A. W. Soley, in this district, has wheat that is five inches high. Practically the same condition prevails in the Fort Saskatchewan, Horse Hills, Salisbury, and the Clover Bar district. In the Nanaimo district, north of Edmonton, the crops seem somewhat more backward than in the other districts mentioned.

Most farmers feel that there is still plenty of time to properly prepare the fields for the barley crop and are taking their time and plowing for barley. The acreage this year that was stubbed in is comparatively small and much smaller than was anticipated. A remarkable feature of the crops this year is the evenness of germination. There has been plenty of moisture in the ground and as a result practically all of the seed has germinated and the fields show a great uniformity of stand.

The prospects for hay crops in the districts surrounding Edmonton this year are better than they have been for the last five or six years. All the pastures are green and making splendid growth, while the tame hay fields which are principally timothy, are showing up exceptionally well and the farmers are of the opinion that there will be a greater tonnage this year than for several years past.

The wild fruits, such as Saskatoons, strawberries, cherries, etc., are all in blossom and from the healthy growing condition of these plants and the number of blossoms there is every indication that the crop of wild fruits will be exceptionally large this season.
