CITY MARKET

Ten Years Ago
in Prince Rupert

June 28, 1910

Rupert McKenzie was on trial this morning before Judge Young on the charge of having shot a man by the name of Heaton in the leg. Dr. Egerton gave evidence as to the nature of the wound and stated that when he first saw it it had already received first dressing from Dr. Reddie. W. E. Williams defended, with L. W. Patmore for the prosecution.

Today the new river steamer Inlander got up as far as Hazelton and the crew and passengers were given a great welcome. Captain Bucey was elated at the way in which the boat could be handled in the swift water and ninety tons of freight were brought safely through and landed. Mr. and Mrs. J. K. S. Sealy were passengers and they arranged a dance in the evening in the new wing of the Omineca Hotel. Harry B. Rochester, the freight and passenger agent, made the announcement that he was receiving many applications for passage, as the people favored the principle of not having to change at the Gan-yan.

Colonel Roosevelt returned home this morning on the Kaiser in Augusta Victoria and as the liner passed Ambrose Light the battleship Caroline was the first to start the saluting. The presidential salute of 21 guns was fired and this is the first occasion that such a courtesy has been accorded a private citizen of the United States.

S. H. Watson & Co. have a big gang of men at work on an excavation work at the corner of Seventh Street and Third Avenue. Wagon traffic has been directed to Eighth Street in the meantime.

This team will be a stronger aggregation than was that of last year so the local promoters are quite confident of gaining the front place in the league. Last year's record was only losing three games out of sixteen which is an enviable one.

About the Players.

Cummings was selected by the sporting editors of the large daily papers in the south to be one of the best amateur short stops in B. C.

Warry Anderson is a real Rupert son although he has earned his reputation on many a field. Ben Self was recently consulted by the manager and captain of the Vancouver team in regard to this local product.

Brown, the catcher, whilst a stranger in Rupert has been doing some star back-stopping in Victoria. Two home-runs in his last game there travelled far over the fence.

An introduction to Clementson is hardly necessary, but it is well for the Rupert fans to know that the handling of the team is absolutely left in his charge for the season. From the practices Clem. has shown himself to be the right man for the job and has handled things in fine style.

McGregor is also a stranger in the city but is recommended by Spud Cummings. He is there with class on the right hand pitching, but wait till he gets slugging that pill. Heavy batting is essential and the lack of this in the Rupert-Wallace series last year practically forfeited the game.

Southpaw.

Brown who will open the season in the box tomorrow for the home team hails from Victoria, where he had eighteen strikeouts last week. The "Bugs" call him a southpaw and Capt. Clem. says that even his straight balls have a kink in them. He is a brother to the catcher and the home-run faculty runs in the family.

Hardy, although shifted from his old position at second base, will not let one fly touch the ground unless it is on the rock pile in left field. His timely hitting is always valued.

Farquhar is also a new player in Prince Rupert, but he showed up in excellent form in the shipyard league to the south. In the Reach official league book he was quoted as batting .299.

Vie Menzies will hold down the keystone sack and under the instructions of the captain has improved wonderfully. He is a favorite with local fans as he is always ready to give his best under all conditions.

Harry Day Too.

Harry Day will be remembered for his clean sporting spirit in baseball, basketball and football. A miracle seems to have happened that he has returned so soon as he was not expected until the middle of July.

Donohue has made Rupert suffer in more than one game when he was receiving for Hazelton. Now he is on our side and his hitting and experience will be valuable.

The rest must be supplied by the fans. A large crowd will have to be there to make up the \$400 guarantee to Stewart.
